Democratic-Conservative Party

STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

ADOPTED IN CONVENTION, AUG. 3, 1875.

The Democratic and Conservative people of the State of Mississippi in Convention assembled, invoking the blessing of Almighty God on their efforts, and inviting the cooperation of all citizens of the State who favor an honest, impartial and economical administration, do adopt the following declaration of their aims and principles:

1st. We recognize and will maintain the civil and political equality of all men as established by the Constitution of the United States and the Amendments thereto.

2d. We are in favor of the education of all the children of the State in public schools, sustained by adequate taxation, but we are opposed to extravagant or partisan administration of said schools.

3d. The selection only of honest, faithful, and competent men, for all offices from the highest to the lowest.

4th. Economy in the administration of the Government; the abolition of useless and unnecessary offices; and a reduction in the fees and salaries of those that are retained, and a strict and rigid accountability of all officers having the custody of public moneys, or charged with its collection.

5th. Biennial sessions of the Legislature, and a reduction in the expenses of that department of the government; and we denounce the Republican party of the State for their violated pledges on this subject.

6th. The selection of an able and competent judiciary, and a confining of the Judges to judicial functions purely, so that all temptation to partisanship on the bench shall be removed.

7th. A discontinuance of the enormous evil of special and local legislation, and in its stead the enactment of general laws under which local and private interests will be fully protected.

8th. The encouragement of agriculture, by securing the farmer and the laborer the just rewards of their toil and capital, and by relief from the burdensome taxation which now consumes their substance.

9th. The encouragement of manufactures in our midst.

10th. The elevation of the standard of official character, so as to infuse into official life a sense of public duty, the spirit of patriotism and integrity, to the end that government, law and public authority may be invested with the moral influence and dignity which will insure respect and obedience.

11th. We favor immediate action of the general government for the protection of the Mississippi river lowlands against inundation.

12th. The building up of partisan newspapers by legislation; the arming of the militia in time of peace, the unconstitutional attempt to take from the people the election of tax collectors, the attempted passage of the Metropolitan Police bill, the attempted corruption of the Judiciary by the use of Executive patronage, we denounce as gross outrages upon the constitutional liberty; while, as evidence of the utter incapacity of our present rulers, to administer the affairs of the State, we point to the mass of confusion in which the revenue and registration laws of the State have become involved; the necessity of extraordinary sessions of the Legislature to cure the blunders and follies of the regular sessions, and to the repeated Executive and legislative acts which have been, by the Supreme Court, declared unconstitutional and void.

13th. That we cordially invite the voters of all the people of both races, to unite vigorously with us in the approaching canvass in a determined effort to give success to the foregoing principles, and thus to secure to ourselves and our posterity, the blessings of an honest, economical government, administered by able, efficient and competent public officers.

BRIDGE TO BE REBUILT.

SEALED PROPOSALS TO BUILD A TRUSS Bridge on the site of the old one, of 60 feet spans over the main stream, benches to be set on piles, and the truss work on the east side of the stream to be in spans of 20 feet each. One and one-fourth round iron to be used in all bolts, of which there is supposed to be enough in the wreck. False caps to be used on the four main benches. Double bolts in foot of each brace. All sound flooring and timber of cypress, or heart pine may be used in rebuilding said bridge, except in the main spans, which must be all new and of long-leafed heart pine.

The bridge will be two feet higher at the east end than the old one, with an apron of thirty feet projecting over the turnpike to ascend to the level over the brick abutment, when this level will be maintained to the west bank of the river, which will bring the top of the cap sills eleven feet below the present top sill on the west bank. It will be seen by this that the bridge will be eleven feet lower than the old one, and on a perfect level from bank to turnpike.

These general items are given in order that bidders may know what the Board will consider.

Plans and specifications will accompany each bid, describing the size of timbers proposed to be used.

The lumber must all be sawed. All sealed bids accompanied with specifications will be received up to Tuesday, the second day of November, 1875, directed to Chancery Clerk, Jackson, Miss., and marked "Bids for Bridge over Pearl River."

The Board reserves the right to reject any or all specifications and bids.

THE LATEST NEWS

Barnum's Hotel to be Closed. NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Barnum's hotel will be closed to-morrow, the present proprietor, Theron Barnum, of St. Louis, having concluded to discontinue business, owing to unfavorable prospects.

Another Suspension. Joseph W. Derery, lumber merchant, suspended yesterday.

More Trouble for Spain. It is stated that the natives of Porto Rico in this and neighboring cities, are forming a committee, after the manner of the Cuban patriots, to co-operate with their fellow-countrymen in an effort to shake off the Spanish yoke, and that a thoroughly organized conspiracy has existed in Porto Rico during the past two years, the head leader being stationed at Kingston, Jamaica.

Burning of the Steamship Aurora. NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 22.—Capt. Johnson, of the steamship Royal Standard from Liverpool, reports that on the 30th Sept. in latitude 36 40, north, long. 31, west, he fell in with the burning wreck of the steamship Aurora; boarded the wreck and found it had been abandoned. The lower hold was a perfect mass of burning seed, everything else that could burn having been consumed. Finding it impossible to save the wreck, it being dangerous to allow it to float around, he scuttled it and proceeded on his way here.

Burned to Death by a Lamp Explosion. Mrs. D. J. Murden died from the effects of a coal-oil lamp explosion—her husband was severely burned in trying to extinguish the flames.

Settlers for Pass Christian. Prof. W. P. Garner and Capt. Frederick Wright, with a party of forty persons from the vicinity of Cleveland, have arrived here en route to Pass Christian, Miss., where they propose locating permanently.

Convening of the Cortes. MADRID, Oct. 22.—A royal decree convening the Cortes will be issued immediately.

A Cuban mail steamer with Sharkey on board arrived at Santander.

Chinese News. LONDON, Oct. 22.—Minister Wade reports to the Foreign office that, in addition to other guarantees, the Chinese Commission to England brings an apology for the Yenan outrage.

Rouher to be Prosecuted. A Paris special to the Echo says that at the coming session of the Assembly an authorization to prosecute Rouher will be asked, for attacking MacMahon and the Constitution.

Wisconsin Whisky Cases. MILWAUKEE, Oct. 22.—In the Erskine whisky brand trial to-day, after two hours consultation, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. The remainder of the cases are postponed till Nov. 8th.

Corner-Stone Laid. BALTIMORE, Oct. 22.—Bishop Cummings laid the corner-stone of the Reformed Episcopal Church of the Redeemer. The church will be of marble.
