

It is extremely probable that the congress, which was to be held at Luneville, in case the English had consented to send thither a negotiator, will be held at Paris, where the ministers of the greatest powers in Europe have already arrived. The first consequence which will thence result is, that the English will have no representative here, and that peace will be concluded without them. The second is, that the negotiations will be carried on with more effect under the eyes of a man accustomed to employ as much sincerity as diplomat in his deliberations. The chief trait by which his genius is characterized, is to see far and at one glance. We shall therefore be not far from the truth, and shall gratify the most ardent wish of our heart, if we foresee that the anniversary of the 18th Brumaire, year 8, he strangled the monster anarchy—On the 18th Brumaire, year 8, he put an end to the scourge of war?

From Germau Papers.

"Copenhagen, October 7.

"The Government of Denmark has not been known to have any diplomatic character near the United States of America. However, as the commerce of Denmark has greatly increased, it has been considered necessary and expedient to fill this post under the present circumstances. Our consul at Morocco, Blicher Olsen, has consequently been appointed minister resident from our court to the Government of the United States; and next spring will go thither in that character. His residence is to be at the City of Washington."

Vienna, 5th October.

Private letters from Prague inform us that the A. Charles has accepted the nomination of Generalissimo. Great preparations were made for his reception at Court. There is no doubt but the army will be rejoiced to see him. Although a great deal about preliminary articles and ratifications is said, the preparations indicate nothing but warlike prospects, and nothing short of hostilities are expected; in which case we expect to be supported by a large Russian army.—Prince Charles is to command in person in Germany, and Prince John in Italy with the assistance of General Mack.

The Emperor has received two thirds of the subsidy of two millions, sterling, from the British. The Elector of Bavaria has also received three quarters of their subsidy to him; they also say that he is shortly to receive a greater sum on account of new subsidies: from which it appears, that the English are more than two millions sterling, in advance, without including the sums paid to the Duke of Wirtemberg, to the Elector of Mayence, the Prince de Conde, to the Swiss emigrants, &c.

October 6.

The General in Chief Moreau arrived here last evening, at 6 o'clock, in company with General Macdonald; their arrival was announced by the discharge of artillery. An elegant ball was given them, at which the greater part of the Diet attended. We are assured that before his departure from Augsburg, general Moreau furnished passports for the Count de Cobentzel. On his way here he visited the fortresses of Ingolstadt, and the monument erecting to the memory of the brave Latour d'Auvergne.

The Congress of Luneville is provisionally transferred to Paris. We know that Count Cobentzel has arrived here, that citizen Joseph Buonaparte returned along with him, and that the marquis of Lucchesini, the minister plenipotentiary of the king of Prussia, has also arrived. It is asserted, that the conferences which take place at Paris, will not retard the opening of the Congress; on the contrary, it is probable they will hasten the result. M. Cetto, the Bavarian minister, has also arrived. It is asserted in a positive manner in letters from Vienna, that the differences which existed between that court and the court of Petersburg, have terminated to the satisfaction of the two monarchs, and they mention as a proof of it that the grand Duke Constantine, who was in Galicia at the time of the grand military reviews, commanded on that occasion a division of Austrian troops. This accommodation, which is probable will not however be carried so far as to produce an alliance, offensive and defensive between the two courts:

the engagements which Russia has entered into with Prussia, must interdict the former from making any alliance that might be contrary to the object of the armed mediation.

The last armistice was to expire on the 20th October. It is said, but we know not on what foundation, that it will be prolonged for four months; it is no more probable that it will be prolonged to the end of the negotiations, the result of which is still involved in obscurity.

The Senate have confirmed the nomination of JOHN JAY, as Chief Justice of the United States.

We understand, that the President of the United States has offered, through the Secretary of the Navy, to Capt. Little, his officers and men, his congratulations on their late success, and his sincere wishes for their future glory.

The Secretary of the Navy it is also said, has expressed himself to this purport, that it was before known that the captain, officers and crew of the *Boston*, only wanted an opportunity to be offered them to do honor to themselves and their country.

The house of delegates of Virginia have passed an act against DUELLING, which provides that the property both of the challenger and the challenged, and the person carrying a challenge, shall pass immediately to their heirs on giving or receiving it; that they shall be incapacitated from holding real estate; and shall be disabled from holding any office under the government.

The bill has been rejected in Senate.

Mr. BACON, the republican candidate, is elected a member of the H. of R. of the U. S. for Massachusetts. In the district the votes were, for Mr. Bacon 1427, for Mr. Williams 1381; scattering 43.

Mr. LEE, the federal candidate, is elected for the First Eastern district.

Robert Liston, the English minister, is now at Norfolk, from which place he intends to sail for England. Mr. Thornton remains in the character of Charge des Affaires.

Oliver Ellsworth, one of the American Envoys to France, arrived at London on the 29th of October. He is highly spoken of by the London editors.

Since his trial HADFIELD has remained in Newgate, from which place he has been lately removed to Bedlam, where an apartment had been prepared for his reception. He was dressed in a dark coat, and appeared to be perfectly calm and collected. When he arrived at Bedlam, he expressed some objection to the place, but added, "I dare say there are many better men here than myself, and I am sure there are many out of Bedlam who deserve to be in as much as I do."

Capt Barclay arrived at New York from St. Sebastians informs that all intercourse between France and Spain is stopped, in consequence of the plague which rages in all parts of the latter kingdom. All American vessels are obliged to perform quarantine; and what is very singular, they attribute the introduction of their calamity to vessels from this country.

### LEGISLATURE OF VIRGINIA.

The following Resolution passed the house of Delegates on the 22 instant.

Whereas the General Assembly of this commonwealth at their session, which commenced in December in the year 1798, passed sundry resolutions, in one of which they solemnly protest against the act of Congress, commonly called the Fugitive Law, as a palpable and alarming infraction of the Constitution of the United States.

And whereas the General Assembly of this commonwealth, at their session, which commenced in December in the year 1799, repeated this solemn protestation against the said act of Congress, and moreover, directed the publication of the report of a select committee, containing a fair and candid representation of the reasons on which that measure was founded; a report of which the members composing this present General Assembly take pleasure in expressing their decided ap-

probation, not only because of the perspicuity and irresistible force of the arguments which it contains, but because a disposition to promote "mutual respect confidence and affection among the members of the union," is uniformly preserved.

And whereas recent occurrences have taken place in several parts of the United States, and particularly in this commonwealth, which justify the apprehensions expressed by the said General Assemblies, and which prove that the said act is as oppressive and dangerous in practice, as it is erroneous in principle.

And whereas the said last mentioned General Assembly by their resolution passed on the 11th day of January last, instructed the Senators from this state in the Congress of the United States to oppose the passing of any law founded on or recognizing the doctrine lately advanced that the common law of England is in force under the government of the United States, a doctrine which they truly declared to be novel in its principles and tremendous in its consequences; and the members of the present General Assembly, after the most mature deliberation are of opinion that the said doctrine tends directly to the subversion of a fundamental article in the constitution, namely, that the general government possesses no powers but those which are expressly granted:—therefore,

Resolved, That the Senators from this state in the Congress of the State, be instructed, and that the representatives be requested, to avail themselves of every opportunity to obtain a repeal of the said act of Congress, and to oppose any law or resolution containing a recognition of the said doctrine.
