

GEORGE TOWN COLLEGE,
In the District of Columbia, United States of America, under the direction of the Incorporated Catholic Clergy of the State of Maryland.

I. The annual pension of this establishment is two hundred and twenty dollars; but for children under twelve years of age, only two hundred dollars will be required. These students who continue their education through the studies of Philosophy shall, on account of extraordinary expenses, and some particular inducements showed them, pay two hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

The pension is to be paid half yearly in advance. A deduction of fifty dollars per annum will be allowed to those parents who may choose to charge themselves with the detail of clothing their children. The college will furnish washing and mending; but will not keep particular accounts, or become answerable for clothing provided by parents.

II. In lieu of bed linen, table service, school books, and other articles usually required on entering establishments of this kind, each student shall pay ten dollars entrance money.

III. The Sunday or holiday dress is uniform, and consists of a pair of coat of blue cloth, with yellow buttons, red cloth or kerseymer waistcoats. The use of silk is not permitted. Every student shall bring with him his uniform dress, besides a pair of daily wear, six shirts, six neck handkerchiefs, six pocket handkerchiefs, six pairs of stockings, and three pairs of shoes, all new. Any deficiency in the above will be charged to the parents.

IV. On the above terms the students are furnished with clothes, linen, washing, mending, lodging, board, fire, candle, table, school books, pen, ink, paper, amusements, and school rewards; so that nothing will remain to the charge of the parents, but medical attendance and medicines, postage, and such extra lessons of drawing, dancing, music, &c. which they may choose to order for their children.

V. The religion, uniformly practiced by the students living in the college, is the Roman Catholic; but for students of other religions, there are boarding houses, convenient to the college, where they will be subject to the same rules (religion excepted) and enjoy the same advantages for their improvement in science as the performers of the college.

VI. Our boarders must be furnished by their parents with the uniform of the college, and pay annually for tuition, fire, candle, school books, pen, ink, paper, amusements, school rewards, &c. fifty dollars, always paid yearly in advance.

VII. The students are taught English, Latin, Greek, and all the branches of Classical Education, sacred and profane History, Geography, the use of the Globes, Arithmetic, and when sufficiently advanced Algebra and Geometry, with all the other parts of the Mathematics in the respective classes. Particular care is taken that they learn to read well, and write a good hand, and that they speak and write French with accuracy. Four times a year the students are called to a public examination of what they have taught before Parents and the Friends of Literature. Those who have made extraordinary progress are honored and rewarded. The idle, for punishment, are confined in the vacation to certain extraordinary hours of study during play-time, in order to repair what they have neglected to learn in school; therefore, if they are found defective in the last and most important examination of the year, before the August vacation, they will not be allowed to go home during that time.

VIII. The age of admission is from eight to fourteen. When children are not sufficiently advanced to begin a regular course of classical education, they are placed in an elementary class, attended by a particular teacher, from whom they learn to spell, read, and write.

IX. If the children sent to this College have been before at any other house of education, an attestation of their morals and docility is required.

X. The greatest care is taken to instruct the children in the duties of Religion and Morality, and they are constantly under the eye of one or more of the Professors, who see that those duties are practiced, and that the rules of civility are not violated.

XI. Cleanliness and exercise, and every thing which contributes to health, are attended to with particular care.

XII. All the pensioners dine and sup with their professors, and have the same table which they have. No dissolutions are allowed in diet or clothing.

XIII. As long experience has convinced the directors, that a provision of pocket money is very prejudicial, not only to good order, but even to study and application, they therefore request that parents will not be so far said in indulging their children in more than fifty cents at most per month, for this purpose.

XIV. No allowance is made for absence during the vacation, which begins on the 15th August, and ends the 15th of September. To these terms the parents are desired to be particularly attentive, in case they choose to call their children home, as the absence of a few weeks at the opening of school is seldom repaired without very great difficulty. Absence from school at no other time will be permitted. It is indeed the most serious and extreme desire of the Directors, that the children should never be called home during the course of their education, as they have found by experience, that such vocations have often proved prejudicial, not only to study and application, but even to content and happiness. Those children who may be received into the college upon other terms, either totally or partially than those provided by their parents or guardians, will not be allowed to go home or absent themselves from the college during the full course of their education, unless particular circumstances in the judgment of the President should require permission of absence for a time.

XV. When children are removed from the College, whatever new linen or clothes are furnished them on that occasion, will be charged to their parents. After entering on a new quarter, no deduction will be made for the remaining part thereof.

The college is a large building, capable of lodging two hundred persons conveniently. The garden and court adjoining, where the young gentlemen play, are very airy and spacious. The situation is very pleasant and healthy.

It will contribute much to the advantage of the children, if parents on sending them will inform the President how long they propose to leave them at the College, and for what employments in life they are designed. The regular course of education is properly classical; but such as are designed for the commercial line, have a lesson of Arithmetic and Book-Keeping, under a particular Professor appointed for that purpose.

N. B. The above Regulations and Conditions will take place from the 15th day of August, 1804, for all such as enter at, or after that period; but for others, they will only commence at the expiration of the six months, for which the advance payment had become due prior to that term.
