NEW YORK TILDEN CLUB FORMED

First Step for a National Organization to Carry Out Cleveland's Ideas.

New York, Jan. 4.—Grover Cleveland, David B. Hill, Daniel S. Lamont, William F. Sheehan, William C. Whitney, Jacob A. Cantor and other democrats, it is announced, are to become members of the Samuel J. Tilden Club, just organized, says the Journal.

The club is to be the pioneer in the movement suggested by Grover Cleveland for the reorganization of the democracy and to promulgate true democratic principles throughout the United States.

It is to be a national as well as a state and local institution and it will seek to have nominated for office only "simon pure" democrats, running on "old-fashioned" democratic platforms.

KEEP THE CHURCHES OPEN

EVIL IS AWAKE ALL THE TIME

Suggestion at a Meeting of the Presbyterian Committee on Twentieth Century Fund.

New York, Jan. 4.—A meeting under the direction of the Presbyterian committee on the twentieth century fund was held last night in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church to arouse interest for the extension of the branches of the work of the church at the beginning of the twentieth century.

Rev. Marcus Brownson of Philadelphia said that the movement had been organized in 127 presbyteries and \$200,000 had already been contributed.

Dr. Frank Ellinwood, secretary of the board of foreign missions, pleaded for the foreign missions aspect of special efforts to pay off the mortgages amounting to half a million, on the Presbyterian building in Fifth avenue.

He said that half of that amount had been promised by a prominent Presbyterian in this city on condition that the board raise the remainder before March 12.

William E. Dodge, Jr., said: "In this city we have millions invested in costly church edifices, mostly among the rich. These churches are open about three hours a week, and closed all the rest of the time, while evil is always awake.

I believe we will be obliged to place our churches on a business basis and keep them open all the time to let the people in, and a great crew of clergymen attached to each church ready to minister unto the people who need their ministrations at all times of the day.

QUAY GETS THE ONE VOTE

LANDS SUPPOSED ANTI-QUAY MAN

This, It is Thought, Will Give Him the 127 Votes He Needs for Election.

Waynesboro, Pa., Jan. 4.—Benjamin F. Welby, one of the two republican representatives from Franklin county in the Pennsylvania legislature, admits that he will vote for Mr. Quay for United States senator. Mr. Welby did not participate in the caucus that nominated Mr. Quay. Mr. Welby acknowledges that he signed both Quay and anti-Quay pledges.

The Quay leaders say that the accession of Mr. Welby gives them the 127 votes necessary to elect. Three votes in the caucus are certain to vote for Mr. Quay, they say and there were 123 at the caucus.

SENATE PLAN IS TO FIX THEM FOR THE NEXT FOUR YEARS.

Estimates for Next Year Are Larger Than for the Year Before the War.

REMOVE BURDENSOME LEVIES

Estimates for Next Year Are Larger Than for the Year Before the War.

Washington, Jan. 4.—The senate committee on finance has progressed so far in the preliminary work on the war revenue measure as to have ascertained with approximate accuracy the probable expenditures for the coming two fiscal years.

This has been accomplished by a series of tables showing the amounts estimated and actually appropriated for the past two years.

With the exception of 1898 and 1899, when expenditures were unexpectedly swelled far beyond expectations, the estimates and the expenditures have tallied very closely.

The tables show that although the war closed a long time ago, except in the Philippines, the amount for the next fiscal year is far in excess of what was asked for in 1897, the year before war was declared.

These tables will be taken as the basis for amendments to the house bill.

It is still the idea of the committee to have a scientifically constructed measure that will lessen and remove the heaviest most burdensome to those least able to pay them, and so constructed, moreover, that it will not be necessary to make another revenue measure during the life of the second McKinley administration.

GOLD AND SILVER

Director Roberts Makes His Estimate of the Year's Production.

Washington, Jan. 4.—George E. Roberts, the director of the mint, has made public his preliminary estimate of the production of gold and silver in the United States during the calendar year 1900.

The aggregate of gold is given as \$3,837,213 fine ounces, valued at \$79,322,281; and of silver, \$9,810,545 fine ounces, which, at the approximate average price of 61 cents for the year, makes the value \$6,000,431.

During the calendar year 1899 the gold production was \$7,003,400, and the silver production \$4,750,000 fine ounces. The Nome gold and silver production for 1900 is given as \$5,100,000, and that of the Klondike, which includes both the American and Canadian fields, \$2,287,566.

The product of the Canadian mines is not included in the figures given, but as the gold and silver comes to the American market and is valued separately.

An increase of more than 100 per cent in the money of the world within less than a generation will be one of the most interesting exhibits of the annual report of the director of the mint.

Director Roberts finds that, while the total money supply of the world has increased about \$7,000,000,000, the increase in gold money since 1870 has been about \$3,800,000,000, in silver about \$2,750,000,000 and in uncovered paper only about \$500,000,000.

WAR IS POSSIBLE

Senator Hawley Fears Possible Complication With Europe.

Washington, Jan. 4.—In the debate on the army bill in the senate Senator Hawley said: "We are not altogether out of sight of some possibility of war with some European power. It is not known. There are in a great deal of trouble there and I understand they look with very great jealousy upon our talk of a Danish island and our talk about acquiring other territory."

Pettigrew Resolutions.

Washington, Jan. 4.—In the senate yesterday Mr. Pettigrew introduced the following resolution: "That the president is hereby requested, if not incompatible with the public interests, to inform the senate what necessity, if any, exists for increasing the army at this time; what are the conditions in the Philippines, and how many men are required there. The president is also requested to send to the senate the communications received from our officers in the Philippines showing the conditions in that country and the number of men required for the future."

Senator Pettigrew gave notice that he would propose the following as an amendment to the army reorganization bill: "It is further proposed that one-third of the original vacancies created by this act in the regular army be filled by volunteers from the militia and naval reserve, in both staff and line, shall be filled by selection from the officers of volunteers."

Washington Notes. John Goodnow has wired his friends in Washington that he will arrive there Monday afternoon.

Oscar F. Williams' nomination to be consul general of the United States in Singapore is the answer the administration makes to the charges that he was mixed up in mining deals at Manila.

An adverse report has been submitted by the board upon the advisability of locating a dry dock and naval station on the Columbia river, Oregon. A bar at the mouth of the river is the cause.

Three American warships will be gathered next week in Venezuelan waters. Not only will the Hartford remain at La Guayra, but she will be joined by the Scorpion and the auxiliary cruiser Buffalo.

The president sent a message to congress declining to comply with the resolution requesting transmission of the Lashaw report in relation to the irregularities in connection with postal affairs in Cuba. Secretary Root advised that it would be impolitic to make the report public while the prosecutions are pending.

Senator Harris has introduced a resolution in the senate directing the interstate commerce commission to investigate whether there now exists any association or association of carriers for the purpose of controlling and restraining competition in transportation rates of traffic on the lines from the Mississippi to the Missouri river and the Rocky mountains which operate similarly to the association known as the trans-Missouri railway association, that was declared by the supreme court of the United States to be an unlawful combination and in violation of the anti-trust law.

HEAVY FIRE LOSS

Large Increase Last Year Over the Losses in 1899.

New York, Jan. 4.—Fire underwriters suffered terribly during 1899, says the Journal of Commerce. The aggregate fire loss of the United States and Canada during that year just closed was \$168,362,250. The total losses for 1898 were \$119,550,500, and for 1897, \$138,773,200.
