An Investigation of Prospective Business Now Being Made.

POWER IS TO BE A SPECIALTY

The Service, Conducted at the Son's Residence, Marked by Great Simplicity.

The simple burial service of the Catholic church was read this morning over the mortal remains of the late Ignatius Donnelly at the residence of his son, Fred O. Tilton, 817 Portland avenue, St. Paul.

The uncertainty that has hovered about the Coon Creek dam proposition which has engaged the attention of Thomas Lowry and other capitalists for years, was dispelled this morning by Mr. Lowry himself.

Mr. Lowry's positive statement that the dam will be built at an early date is not the only evidence that he means business. Within the past week hundreds of circulars have been mailed to business houses and manufacturing plants throughout the city asking for statements of the electric power they could use if the same was furnished at a reasonable rate.

The service was conducted by Father Ambrose, McNulty, of St. Luke's church, and music was rendered by a male quartet from the cathedral, in charge of John Gahan.

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
