FUND FOR A WARSHIP

Seattle People Will Raise Money for Moran Bros. BUILD VESSEL ON THE COAST

Contract Price Must Be Reduced If a Battleship Is to Be Built There.

Washington, Jan. 7.—The navy department has been informed that the citizens of Seattle have pledged themselves to raise a fund of \$100,000 to be paid to Moran Bros., the local shipbuilding concern, to enable the firm to accept the proposal of the navy department to build a battleship at the yard named in the act of congress. To comply with the department's requirements the Morans must reduce their bid \$200,000, so that even with the bonus of \$100,000, the net reduction must be \$100,000.



Former Insurgent Officers Address Meetings Advising Submission. Manila, Jan. 7.—General MacArthur has ordered the deportation of Generals Ricarte, Del Pilar, Hizon, Lanera and Santos to the island of Guam. Nine regimental and four subordinate officers, with eight civilians, including Trias, Tecson and Matul, notorious assistants of the insurgents, have also been ordered to be deported. It is General MacArthur's intention to hold most of the captured leaders in Guam until peace is declared.

WINONA P. O. LOOMING UP. Special to The Journal. Winona, Minn., Jan. 7.—The report of the Winona postoffice for the calendar year shows a revenue of \$29,857.25, assuring that the \$40,000 mark will be passed and Winona will be a first class postoffice. The gains the past year were as follows: Revenue, \$3,670.85; money order transactions, \$94,232.34.

BOERS INFLECT A HEAVY LOSS IN A BATTLE NEAR LINDLEY.

ENGAGEMENT AT NAAUPOORT. Boers Are Forced to Retire and Commandant Duprez Is Captured.

London, Jan. 7.—Reporting to the war office under date of Jan. 6, Lord Kitchener says: Yesterday Babington engaged Delarey's and Steenkamp's commandos at Nauapoort. The enemy was forced to retire to the north-west. Our casualties have not yet been received, but are reported light. A Boer doctor admitted that twenty Boers were killed or wounded. Commandant Duprez was taken prisoner.

GENERAL UNEASINESS. British Residents Are Flocking to Cape Town.

London, Jan. 7.—Despite the rapid progress made in arming the loyalists there is general uneasiness. Owing to the ignorance concerning the whereabouts of the Boers.

No Troops From Vancouver. Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 7.—Owing to the demand of the imperial authorities that all mounted police recruits for South Africa must pay their fare to Cape Town and officers, all ideas of raising a corps in British Columbia have been abandoned.

Batteries Strengthened. Cape Town, Jan. 7.—The Cape Town batteries have been heavily reinforced with guns and men.

BISHOP LAID TO REST. THE FUNERAL OF W. X. NINDE. Addresses by Three Bishops Including Bishop Joyce of Minneapolis—The Services.

Detroit, Jan. 7.—After an impressive funeral service had been conducted today over the remains of Bishop W. X. Ninde of the Methodist Episcopal church at his residence, the body was removed to the Central M. E. church. Here it lay in state from 10:30 until 12:30 while a consoling procession of people of all classes and creeds passed slowly by.
