"PEBBLE JACK" FOR CAPTAIN

Glasscock Stated to Lead Western League Team in Minneapolis This Year.

All the inner circle of Minneapolis baseball went wild when the report that Jack Glasscock was to captain the Minneapolis team of the Western league next summer had been duly circulated and digested.

There does not appear to be any question but that the Sioux City franchise in the Western league has been transferred to Minneapolis and that A. B. Beall, who will be the Western league representative in this city.

By the end of this week the baseball situation which is now at cross purposes everywhere ought to be untangled.

President Hickey will not call the Western league together until next week, but the plans of the league will probably be known as the action taken by his own organizations.

A report that Indianapolis and Louisville will be admitted to the Western league has been revived and this has led to another report that a ten-club league is in prospect.

MANY DROWNED IN CHINA

A RIVER STEAMER OVERLOADED

One Hundred Fifty Lose Their Lives—Many Killed in Powder Works Explosion.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 14.—One hundred and fifty lives were lost in an accident which occurred four weeks ago to a passenger steamer plying on West river between Sanchau and Canton.

A terrible explosion took place in the powder works at Hang Chow, China, Dec. 27, 1900, in which sixty and seventy persons lost their lives.

WRECKS ON THE N. P.

Overland Westbound Train Derailed Near Selah, Wash.

NO ONE SERIOUSLY INJURED

Heavy Rains Undermine Tracks and Threaten Dams and Milling Property.

Ellensburg, Wash., Jan. 14.—The westbound overland Northern Pacific was wrecked yesterday one and one-half miles west of Selah, on a slough bridge 100 feet long.

Engineer Baird felt the bridge sinking and threw the throttle wide open. The engine passed over, but the tender went down eighteen feet. All the coaches with the exception of the last sleeper were derailed and the dining car was broken into two pieces.

A few of the passengers received slight cuts but no one was seriously injured. The passenger train on the South Bend branch ran into a slide near Adna, throwing the engine and mail car off the track. The engineer was badly injured.

An engine and mail car on the Gray's Harbor branch were thrown into the Chehalis river, overtopping the trestle work between Porter and Oakville. The passengers had a narrow escape. The fireman was injured.

RAIN AND WIND STORMS

Three-Day Tempest in Washington State Does Great Damage.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 14.—The hardest rain and wind storm of the winter prevailed over the northwest for three days past. The rivers are running bank full, and several, including the Cowlitz, the Chehalis, the Puyallup and the Great and only George River, of log booms have been washed away.

The Prescott and Vennes sawmills, near Winlock, are in great danger of being washed away, the water having cut around six dams, forcing the logs against the mills with a tremendous pressure.

All the northwestern railroads are experiencing some trouble from washouts and slides. The Great Northern, between Everett and Seattle is buried under numerous slides, and the same road has several washouts in the Cascade mountains. The Oregon Railroad & Navigation line, east of Portland, is completely blocked for the same reason.

WASHOUTS IN OREGON

Passenger Train Is Wrecked by a Landslide—Engineer Killed.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 14.—Heavy rains for two days have caused many slides to rise and railroad traffic in the northwest has been delayed by washouts. All the main lines have been cleared, however, and today trains are running close to schedule time.

ASTORIA, ORE., JAN. 14.—A passenger train on the Astoria & Columbia railway ran into a landslide near Clifton, near here.

The train was derailed and the engineer, William Scott was killed. Fireman James Davis suffered a broken hand and several bruises about the body.

TRANS-ATLANTIC TELEPHONE

American Company Buys Dr. Pupin's Invention.

New York, Jan. 14.—The Electrical Review announces the purchase by the American Telephone and Telegraph company (the parent Bell company) of the patents of Dr. M. I. Pupin of Columbia college, which will be used in the transatlantic telephony, and which enables telephone messages to be sent over any length of land lines.

It further states that the sum of \$200,000 has been paid to Dr. Pupin for his invention with an annual royalty to him during life of the patents of \$7,500.

Dr. Pupin's invention is said to furnish a method whereby conductors of relatively small diameter covered with rolling material of moderate thickness may be used in place of the large and expensive conductors formerly thought necessary.
