## OBSTACLE IN THE TREATY

### SENATOR DAVIS' AMENDMENT

But England Would Exercise the Same Power as Suez if in Its Interest.

New York, Jan. 15.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: It is not considered probable that the American embassy at the foreign office will take decision upon the amended canal treaty this week. There is a hopeful feeling that the foreign office will take advantage of a favorable opportunity for bringing fifty years of controversy to a close and promoting peace between the two countries. There would be little doubt that the changes in the text would be sanctioned if the Davis amendment were out of the way. This is the chief obstacle, because it is academic in form and vague in application, yet on parallel lines with the Suez convention.

## GROUT HEARINGS CLOSED

### Mr. Grout Says Hotel Guests Are the Real Victims.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The senate committee on agriculture today concluded its hearings on the oleomargarine bill. Congressman Wadsworth, author of the bill, testified for the group bill, arguing that impringing the tax on the industry in large letters, not only upon the paper wrappers, but upon the boxes enclosing the packages, would insure the public against fraud. The oleomargarine industry was perfectly legitimate so long as purchasers knew what they were getting.

Mr. Grout conceded that Mr. Wadsworth's device would protect the purchasers through retail dealers, but two-thirds of the oleomargarine was sold to hotel, restaurant and boarding-house men, who knew what they were getting, but turned it off on their guests. The only protection was to prohibit the coloring of oleomargarine.

### Canal Will Pay.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Senator Morgan has submitted another report on the Nicaragua canal. The report is a special statement of Professor Emory R. Johnson, a member of the isthmian commission, of the traffic resources of the canal and its effect upon commercial industries of the United States. Mr. Morgan says the statement "proves conclusively that as an investment the Nicaragua canal will earn a highly remunerative return on a cost of even \$20,500,000, which is an extreme estimate, presented by the isthmian canal commission."

### Tax Reduction Delayed.

Washington, Jan. 15.—That the present bill providing for a reduction of the war taxes will not be reported to the senate by the action of Senators Aldrich, Sherman, Spooner and Platt, of the senate finance committee, has been reported by the isthmian canal commission.

### More Pay for Judges.

Washington, Jan. 15.—An amendment to the legislative appropriation bill, increasing the salaries of judges of the supreme and other United States courts has been reported favorably to the senate. It increases from \$15,000 to \$15,500 the salary of the chief justice of the supreme court, from \$10,000 to \$10,500 the salaries of United States circuit judges are raised from \$7,500 to \$8,000, and those of United States district judges and judges of the court of claims, from \$5,000 to \$5,500. These increases are to be in full allowance for traveling expenses now paid.

### Washington Notes.

Authority has been granted for the organization of the State Bank of Northwood, N. D., capital, \$25,000.

Efforts are being made by Representative leading to secure the passage of a bill for improvements in the weather bureau at Bismarck, N. D.

Representative Spalding of North Dakota will appear before the senate committee to urge a favorable report on a bill introduced for the relief of Paul Crum of Fargo.

Another appointment that will be made as soon as Messrs. Burke and Gamble have had a conference is to fill the vacancy in the Southern District of Iowa. It is understood that Nye Phillips will be recommended.

The First National Bank of St. Paul was approved as a reserve agent for the Montana National Bank of Helena. The First National Bank of Minneapolis, for the First National Bank of Park Rapids, Minn.

The resignation of A. K. Gardner, register of the Rapid City (S. D.) court, has been received. Representative Burke says an appointment should be made as soon as Representative Gamble arrives in senate. Bennett, Myron Wiley and J. B. Henry, all of Rapid City, are competing for the office.

A letter received from a naval officer in China indicates that the charge of cowardice against Captain Hall at Peking is due to some extent at least to the fact that the officers of the American legation, who were ordered because the marines did not treat her with what she considered proper respect.

View-President-elect and Mrs. Roosevelt have leased for the spring season the residence of Bellamy Storer, United States minister to Spain, which is in Rhode Island avenue and Seventeenth street N.W., and is well adapted for entertaining. It has one of the most handsome music-rooms at the capital.

A statement of the exports and imports of the United States shows that during December, 1900, the imports of merchandise amounted to \$69,869,909, as against \$70,723,843 for the corresponding month in 1899. The exports of domestic merchandise during December amounted to \$14,197,416, as against \$12,284,424 for December, 1899.

Mr. Teller of Colorado, in the senate yesterday, delivered a sensational denunciation of General Egan, former commissary general of the United States army. His statement also included the administration, because General Egan had been retired, according to the Colorado senator's charge, as a "decoration and a reward" for his attack upon the commanding general of the army.

It has been decided by the postal officials to make a further investigation of the Anoka, Minn., postoffice. It was reported that Inspector Meyer had treated Assistant Postmaster Poole unfairly. The officials say the latter recommended that another inspector be sent to Anoka, who confirmed the report of Meyer that there was a shortage. Another inspector will be sent to Anoka to make a full investigation.

### MRS. NATION OUT OF JAIL.

Kansas W. C. T. U. Woman Is Released on Bail.

Wichita, Kan., Jan. 15.—Mrs. Carrie Nation of the W. C. T. U., who has been in jail for a month charging with smashing saloon fixtures, was released on bail today in the sum of \$200. Her detention was prolonged owing to quarantine on the jail. She will be tried Monday.

## RAILROAD RUMBLE

### COMPROMISE APPROVED

#### Attorney General Douglas Favors Offer of Little Falls & Dakota.

Attorney-General Douglas in his biennial report will recommend the acceptance of a compromise tendered the state by the Little Falls & Dakota railroad. The road obtained 15,000 acres more land than it was entitled to under its grant, and Attorney-General Childs sued for its recovery. The contention of the railroad was that though it had not completed the railway, it was entitled to the land to claim a certain portion of the grant. It had constructed twenty-seven miles, and therefore had a right to 65,000 acres more than it had received. It is the advice of Mr. Childs and the present attorney-general that the compromise be accepted. This contemplates a grant of 30,000 acres by the state. Attorney-General Douglas' report will be issued in about a week.
