
**BEFORE THE PUBLIC EYE**

**THREE ELECTION BILLS**

All of them are from Hennepin County Members.

Three election bills made their appearance in the house last evening, a Hennepin alder being responsible in each instance. Two came from Mr. Roberts, one his primary election bill of last session, a second bill for alteration of the names of candidates on the official ballot. The purpose of the measure is designed to obviate the unfair advantage now accruing to any office seeker who stands first on the ticket. It is a bill for alteration of the laws that would first and second position there is usually a difference of 10 per cent.

**New Law for Tenants.**

Mr. Dunn of St. Paul became responsible for a trio of some importance. One changes the common law rule so that tenants of real property holding over under a lease of a year or term of years can only be made to pay rent for a period equal to the shortest time between payments under the lease. Another of the laws he would enact provides that payments of debt shall not extend time within which mortgage foreclosure may be made by action. A general act of the mortgage agreement, the enactment necessary, or at least desirable. The third of the Dunn bills amends the chattel mortgage law so that where exempt property is included in such an instrument and husband and wife have not both signed, the mortgage will be void only as to the exempt property. As the law now reads, inclusion of exempt property is fatal to the validity of the mortgage.

**Burial of Soldiers.**

The Johnson bill was made the subject of a motion for suspension of the rules, but objection was effectively made. The bill provides for the burial of soldiers and sailors who engaged in the war with Spain, where such men have been destitute and left nothing for funeral expenses. The bill to-day appropriate \$25 for each case reported where public burial is necessary for survivors of the Mexican or civil wars.

**BILLS NUMEROUS**

**One Favors Reduction in District Court Fees.**

The number of bills in the house introduced was surprisingly large for so early a day. Twelve, all told, came in. Included, was a series bearing the name of Mr. Hagan looking to a reduction of district court fees. The bill is in a measure for a clerk to each of the supreme court judges. There was a bill by Mr. Jackson, also, for a transfer of certain Minnesota regimental standards to the tomb of General Grant in Riverside Park, New York city.

As explaining the bill introduced this morning for a clerk for each of the justices of the supreme court, it is said Justice Collins has been called upon to write 1,250 opinions. Recently he has called in a stenographer, but by far the greater number of his opinions have been laboriously penned by himself. The manual labor of writing an opinion of say 1,000 or 1,500 words is no small item, and it can be easily understood how much valuable time is wasted.

Mr. Hillmond fathered an amendment to the election law; Mr. Gandrud a repeal of the 1895 law encouraging the use of wide-tired wagons; Mr. Jackson a bill for the appointment of a commission to locate the positions of Minnesota troops in the historic campaign and siege of Vicksburg.

The osteopaths have agreed on a bill this winter and it will soon be introduced in both houses. A committee of the association agreed on the terms Saturday night. The regulations of osteopathy as a school of medicine, osteopaths to be given a place on the state medical board, and practitioners to take examinations and licenses before being permitted to practice. Osteopathy, according to the bill, will also be required to take the same examination as physicians of the old school save that instead of materia medica they will be required to take a course in anatomy. The state medical association will oppose the bill and, it is reported, will introduce another bill, recognizing osteopathy and licensing its practitioners but not giving them a member of the board. Two years ago the osteopaths were unable to agree on a bill. This winter it will be a straight contest. Brief Night Session. The part Hennepin county played in the speakership fight was strongly emphasized by the generous recognition extended leading members of the local delegation. The fifth has more chairmanships than any other district in the state. Mr. Wallace who did splendid service in lining up votes for Dowling, holds one of the most important places on the list. He has been made chairman of the committee on taxes and tax laws, replacing Mr. Laybourne of Duluth. The latter was transferred to the committee on public buildings. Speaker Dowling, determined that no charge of unfairness toward his vanquished rival should be made possible. He signed Mr. Laybourne subsequently some of the most desirable places in the entire lot. The chairmanship of the committee on public lands goes to Mr. Roberts; that of the committee on university and university lands to Mr. Deming; that of public buildings to Mr. Sweet. Of the old house, Alvin Jacobson retains the chairmanship of the committee on appropriations. Mr. Ferris, another veteran, has the committee on railroads for another session. Mr. Dunn, chairman of the committee on judiciary two years ago, retires in favor of Mr. Allen, of the first district; but this was voluntary. Mr. Bush again has the committee on public buildings. Mr. Peterson, of the old house, was a candidate, but there was opposition on the ground that in the last campaign he was an anti-Ames republican.
