OLD ROBBERIES AT WATERLOO

Frank Peyton, Held for Murder, Confesses to Various Jobs.

New York Sun Special Service Waterloo, Iowa, Jan. 18.—Frank Peyton confessed to the officers of Sioux City some time ago that he had been connected with several robberies in this city between March, 1898, and June, 1900.

He says he was a member of a gang of thieves that blew open several safes and robbed several offices. The police records show that during that time the wholesale house of Smith, Lichty & Hillman company was robbed; a safe was blown at Dunkerton and \$100 taken; the office of Dentist Ferris was robbed of gold

and money and the safe of the Union Mill company blown and \$50 secured. Peyton is the supposed murderer of John Robson. He was arrested in St. Louis where he confessed to the police that he was the slayer of Robson. Later he changed his story and now protests his innocence. These stories lead the officers to think that perhaps he is seeking notoriety rather than telling the truth.
