

MARKED FOR DEATH

Ministers Demand Punishment of Twelve Boxer Leaders.

TUAN AND LAN MAY BE BANISHED

Death Penalty Must Also Be Pronounced Against Those That Are Dead.

Peking, Feb. 6.—The ministers definitely decided last night to demand the imposition of the death penalty upon all twelve of the Chinese officials who in the list submitted, including those that are dead, on account of the moral effect upon the Chinese.

The sentence upon the living must be inflicted, except in the case of Prince Tuan and Duke Lan, which the emperor may commute to banishment to Turkistan. Kang Yi and Li Heng are dead.

The officials whose punishment has been demanded are: Prince Chuang, commander-in-chief of the Boxers, who had a large share in the responsibility for the massacre of foreigners between June 20 and Aug. 16. He was mainly responsible for the massacre in the provinces, especially in Shansi. He ordered the troops to attack the legations, in opposition to the advice of high mandarins who were looking to a cessation of hostilities. He secured the execution of members of the tsung li yamen favorable to foreigners and was the recognized author of the ultimatum of June 19, ordering the diplomatic corps to leave Peking in twenty-four hours, and he ordered, before the expiration of this date, firing upon all foreigners in the streets of the capital. He was practically the author of the assassination of Baron von Ketteler, the German minister.

Duke Lan, vice president of the police department, who was a criminal accomplice of Prince Chuang and Duke Lan.

Kang Yi, one of the instigators and counselors of the Boxers, who always protected them and was most hostile to any understanding with the foreigners. He was sent at the commencement of June to meet the Boxers and endeavor to deter them from entering the city, but he failed to do so. He was the work of destruction, and he signed, with Prince Tuan and Ying Nien, their principal officers, and prepared the plan for the expulsion and annihilation of foreigners in the provinces.

Chao Su Kiam, a member of the grand council and also minister of justice, one of the leaders against the foreigners and mainly responsible for the execution of the officials killed during the siege for having tried to stop the attack against the legations.

Yu Hsien, the author of the massacre in the Shanpei province. He associated with his own hand foreigners and missionaries.

General Tung Fu Hsiang, who, with Prince Tuan, carried out in Peking the plans against the foreigners and who commanded the attacks on the legations and the soldiers that assassinated the Japanese chancellor.

Li Ping Heng, who used his influence to have the Boxers recognized as loyal and patriotic men, and who led the government to use them to exterminate the foreigners.

Hsi Tung, who has always been one of the officials most hostile to foreigners, who praised the Boxers, and who commanded the attacks on the legations and the soldiers that assassinated the Japanese chancellor.

Hsi Cheng Yu, who has the same responsibility.

Kih Su, one of the officials most hostile to foreigners and the minister at the rites of service of the Boxers.

China Agrees.

Li Hung Chang stated that he was authorized by the emperor to sanction the death penalty demanded, except for Prince Tuan and Lan, who would be degraded and banished, and requested a postponement of action regarding General Tung Fu Hsiang.

PROJECTS ARE MANY Northwest Boundary to See an Era of Railroad Building.

CHARTERS ARE APPLIED FOR Seven Already on File—Some of the Plans Are Sure to Materialize.

Special to The Journal. Grand Forks, B. C., Feb. 6.—No fewer than seven applications for railway charters over routes terminating in or passing through Grand Forks are now being made, and more may follow. Three of these applications are for charters to build from the coast at Vancouver or New Westminster up the Fraser river, across the Hope pass, through the Similkameen valley and along the international boundary to Grand Forks. One application is made to build to Midway, twenty miles west of this city, and a branch fifty miles up the north fork of Kettle river. Another local company also desires to build over the route of the latter branch road.

Two railway projects have Republic, Washington, for their objective. McCraig, Rykert & Co., of Montreal, who own the Republic mine, are at the head of one project, and have secured permission from the secretary of the Interior at Washington to cross the Indian lands in the course of their survey. The other project is fathered by the Grand Forks & Kettle River Railway company, which has ample capital to build the line. It is waiting the decision of the secretary of the Interior as to permission to cross the Indian lands. At least one of these three applications for a Canadian route will be granted, and next summer it is well nigh an era of railroad building in the border country, while if permission to cross the Indian lands is granted to the Grand Forks & Kettle River Railway company, there will be a race to see which will be the first company to haul out the ores of that camp to the smelters in this district.

The deal is practically completed and all that remains to be done is to arrange the exchange of business between the Canadian Northern and the Northern Pacific at the boundary line. WISCONSIN CENTRAL TERMINALS Officials Getting Ready for Minneapolis Improvements.

General Counsel Howard Morris and Chief Engineer R. B. Tweedy, of the Wisconsin Central, were in consultation with representatives of the Wisconsin commission yesterday relative to securing the approval of the commission to certain plans for crossings which the road has on foot in Minneapolis. The Wisconsin Central is about to erect a large freight station and extend its railroad yards over to Boom Island, necessitating the crossing of the tracks of the Great Northern and the Duluth and St. Louis roads. The railway commission will approve the plans.

MUST CONTROL C. G. W. Without It "Community of Ownership" is Void.

New York, Feb. 6.—It is very clear that some developments of importance are expected in Chicago Great Western. A very large amount of stock has been bought by an interest buying for control. The common stock has reached the highest price on record, although it is still relatively lower than other stocks of its class. The stock rose several points with small purchases. There have been frequent rumors lately of a change of control, with Harriman the probable buyer. There will be no use in attempting to control rates by community ownership in the northwest unless the Chicago Great Western is somehow included in the combination.

New Short Line Bridge. The Milwaukee is going ahead with a new bridge across the Mississippi at Minneapolis.

Callaway Reads the Papers. New York, Feb. 6.—President Callaway of the New York Central, when asked to-day if it was true that the New York Central had arranged to lease the line of the Manhattan Elevated railway for a term of 999 years, replied that the first he knew of it had been in the morning papers.

Hurray for the Omaha. Commencing Feb. 11, the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha will reduce its time to the Pacific coast by fourteen hours and its passenger rate \$16.

Freight Fuel Destroyed. Chicago, Feb. 6.—The Record says: Reports are current to the effect that the freight pool maintained by western lines has gone to pieces as a result of rebellious action taken by the Chicago Great Western.
