JULIA SAYS YES, BUT.

Manager Dillingham Would Wed Miss Julia Marlowe.

CLAUSE IN CONTRACT PREVENTS

It Was He Himself That Provided That the Star Should Have No Husband.

New York, Feb. 8.—Cruel parents and harsh fate have kept sweethearts apart in melodrama, but never before on the stage has such a prosaic, yet so tragic, a device as a clause in a contract been used to divide two loving hearts. Yet on Broadway, in the heart of romantic play, a legal phrase prevents the marriage of a popular star and a successful manager.

Charles B. Dillingham, general manager of Charles Frohman's attractions, says he is anxious to make Julia Marlowe the Mary Tudor of "When Knighthood was in Flower," his wife. He has asked her to marry him several times.

Her answer has always been "yes, but—" His last proposal was made after he saw her in her latest role as a princess with a temper. Her answer is always the same. "Yes, but my contract forbids my marriage."

What makes the reply all the more exasperating to Dillingham is that he drew up the papers for Charles Frohman and insisted on the insertion of the clause which now keeps them apart.

PEACE OR TROUBLE

Chinese Situation Now Rests With the Dowager Empress.

MINISTERS' DEMANDS SUBMITTED

If She Refuses to Accede to Them Very Serious Complications May Follow.

Peking, Feb. 8.—The demand of the ministers for the death of princess and officials makes the situation an anxious one, at least until the empress dowager replies to the messages sent her by Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang, the Chinese peace commissioners.

The Chinese commissioners have made no recommendation on the matter of punishment, although they have forwarded all the threats made by the foreign representatives. They freely state that they are afraid the court will refuse to comply with the demand for beheading certain princes and officials, in which case the situation must immediately become grave indeed.

If she offers to compromise by giving a few minor heads, it will show that she is frightened and her ultimate compliance with all the demands may be looked for. If, however, she is defiant and refuses, then the powers will probably force matters. In such an event the possibilities are too serious for speculation.

Rev. W. S. Ament of the American Board of Foreign Missions, whose arrest at Chou-chou by the French and Germans caused trouble a day or so ago, has telegraphed that he has been released and his people have been vindicated. He now demands an explanation from the French and Germans who insist that he was never under arrest.

MORE BLOODSHED

Belief That the Chinese Are Merely Playing for Delay.

Moscow, Feb. 8.—A dispatch from Tokyo says that in the opinion of the Japanese cabinet the continued delay in the negotiations is becoming more dangerous. Only a still stronger concert of the powers can prevent in the near future a renewal of hostilities by the Chinese. It is a case of rather resolute measures or deplorable consequences, which are bound to occur early in the spring. The Chinese are only humbugging the powers by the complicated systems of delays and are trying to gain time to set on foot new plots, which will result in bloodshed far greater than has yet occurred.

Paris, Feb. 8.—Official circles here represent the situation in the interior of China provinces in the worst light possible. Famine is prevalent and the Boxers continue their nefarious exploits.

London, Feb. 8.—The Hongkong correspondent of the Standard claims to have learned from an exceptionally trustworthy source that the famine in the provinces of Shensi and Shansi has been purposely exaggerated by the Chinese authorities with the object of deterring the powers from sending an expedition to Singtau, where the court is at present residing.

SUBMITTED TO THE COURT

Ministers' Demands Are Now Before the Empress.

Peking, Feb. 8.—The Chinese plenipotentiaries have telegraphed to the court the demands of the ministers and are awaiting a reply. From remarks made by both Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang, it is evident they think the court will consider carefully the conditions. It has been strongly intimated to the Chinese by more than one of the foreign ministers that China must agree to the conditions and accept the unpleasant consequences. It is pointed out that the powers are not animating by vindictive motives as, had they been, they would have insisted upon the decapitation of both Prince Tuan and Duke Lu.

DEAF AND DUMB HAZING

TALK TILL FINGERS ARE SORE

Kendall Green Institute Students Are Suspended for Hazing "Ducks."

Washington, Feb. 8.—Hazing among students at Kendall Green institute, a government college for the deaf and dumb, has been punished by the suspension of three young men, A. H. Norris of Indiana and Samuel Nicholas and John Sebastian Fisher of Pittsburg, who would have completed their four years' course next June.

One of the favorite forms of hazing is to compel a "duck"—a first year man—to declaim with his fingers until the muscles become so stiff that he cannot talk any longer. Then the "duck" performs for the amusement of the hazers by going through gymnastics of a mute form. The result is that the "duck" next day is unable to recite his lessons, and his hands remain swollen in some cases for several days.

SMALLPOX AT EVANSTON

Hundreds of Northwestern Students Have Been Exposed.

NEW WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

Weather Bureau Has Perfected a Successful System.

New York, Feb. 8.—A special to the World from Washington says: A new system of wireless telegraphy has been developed by the weather bureau. Said Willis S. Moore, chief of the bureau: We have completed an apparatus that we expect will enable us to signal ships 600 miles or more at sea. We have just completed a station at Roanoke, N. C., and will soon have stations at Hatteras and Cape Henry.

We have succeeded in telegraphing perfectly our wireless system for sixty miles over a rough country around Washington. That, I believe, is fully equal to the best transmission that has ever been accomplished by the Marconi method. Our system is quite distinct from his. We succeeded in sending messages for some distance from a station only three feet high.

ACRE IS PACIFIED

Attempt to Establish South American Republic is Crushed.

Rio Janeiro, Feb. 8.—Official advices have been received from the rubber region that the so-called republic of Acre has been crushed and that the territory in which the rebellion has continued for almost a year has been thoroughly pacified.

CASE AGAINST CARMAN

His Friends Say His Deals Were Sanctioned by the Authorities.

Manila, Feb. 8.—The arrest of G. W. Carman, a former resident of San Francisco, and his partner, Senor Carranza, has surprised the people of Manila. Carman was arrested last year on similar charges but he was immediately released. This time the military authorities say they have documentary evidence found in trunks captured from the insurgent general, Carriles, and the confession of the president of Pangasinan concerning the payment by Carman of \$100,000 for insurgent corps, besides selling the rebels uniform cloth and supplies while he was enjoying the sole privilege, through the courtesy of General Otis, of running ranches through the American lines on the Paag river and the lake region.

The friends of Mr. Carman say that he was a member of General Otis' secret service corps. They say that he is trading with the insurgents was to gain information as to the movements of the rebels, and that it was sanctioned by the authorities.

Carman's conviction would probably lead to the embarrassment of several firms in Manila.

ANOTHER BY CARNEGIE

Big Steel Man Offers Tacoma \$50,000 for a Library.

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 8.—Andrew Carnegie has offered to give the city of Tacoma \$50,000 for a library building on condition that a site be furnished and \$5,000 yearly be spent in maintenance. The city has accepted the gift. It is probable, however, that the amount will be increased to \$75,000, as the city is willing to pay \$75,000 annually toward keeping up the library.
