

CONGRER WOULD TAKE IT

A NOMINATION FOR GOVERNOR

Cannot Afford to Fight for It, However—His Cable to Congressman Hull.

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 12.—A special from Washington says Minister Conger has cabled Congressman Hull he will accept the nomination for governor if tendered him, but cannot make a fight for it. Some politicians believe that Conger alone can pacify the Gear and Cummins factions. It is generally believed, however, that the fight has progressed too far. Cummins, Foster and Perkins having announced themselves as candidates, to permit the taking up of Conger. Congressman Hull says he does not know as he will present Conger's name to the convention.

Sidney A. Foster has transmitted a letter to A. B. Cummins respecting their competing candidacies in which he charges Mr. Cummins with organizing a new machine with which to smash the old one now in control, with seeking the governorship only to be a candidate for the United States senatorship and with trampling under foot for fourteen years all the political rights and claims of his friends in this district.

BUCKET SHOP WAR

Boards of Trade Are Preparing for an Active Campaign.

WANT AN ELEVATOR LAW, TOO

Subsidy Bill Has Not Delayed Legislation—Statue of Washington.

Washington, Feb. 12.—The board of trade men throughout the country are preparing to launch a campaign of education against bucket-shops. They intend to explain to the farmer that the bucket-shop transactions are not in any sense genuine sales; that they are merely bets on the market, and that the widespread prevalence of such betting tends to unsettle legitimate values. Congress will be asked to put a tax upon them high enough to be prohibitive.

The same interests are preparing to move for a law to make it impossible for an elevator man to own the contents of his elevator.

The first bill introduced at this session of congress was for an appropriation of \$100,000 to found a school in each state and territory for teaching vocal speech to deaf children under the school age. Mr. Grow of Pennsylvania is the author. He told of a school established in Philadelphia in 1892 by Mary and Emma Garrett, two sisters who had demonstrated in their school that if a child under 6 years of age is talked to only with the lips, it will learn to speak and to comprehend from watching the lips. The language is never employed in their school. The committee on education has reported the bill favorably.

Contrary to the popular idea, the subsidy bill, notwithstanding it has occupied the attention of the senate for a great many hours during the present session, has not interfered with the regular work of congress. The only important matters on foot have been the regular appropriation bills and the army reorganization. The army bill was signed by the president more than two weeks ago and all of the appropriation bills, as they have come up, have been debated by the senate and passed. The subsidy bill has been debated at odd moments during the session, but nobody cares anything about it. It has not been up for consideration in the house, which has gone ahead with its work as usual.

Secretary Root has recommended to congress that another edition be printed of the "Records of the Union and Confederate Armies, War of the Rebellion." It seems that about 12,000 sets of the work have been distributed throughout the country, but the edition of 1895 only 1,895 have come to libraries and educational institutions, the others being in the hands of individuals, and therefore not accessible to the public. It is estimated that there are more than 3,000 libraries and educational institutions in the country, each one having a book collection of more than 1,000 volumes, and it is the idea of the secretary that copies of this very important work should be placed in all such institutions where the public may consult them at will.

Washington is jubilant over the prospect that congress is to add another George Washington memorial to the city. In the Place d'Iene, Paris, near the Trocadero, is a bronze equestrian statue of the father of his country, the gift of the women of America to the French republic. It was executed by Daniel Chester French and Edward C. Potter, and is said to be one of the finest bits of sculpture of recent years in any country. The senate committee on library has favorably reported a bill for the purchase of a replica of a statue and it is believed it will pass both houses. From the report of the committee the following description of the work is taken:

Washington, in Mr. French's statue, is represented as taking command of the army at Cambridge, dedicating his sword to the service of his country, and appealing to heaven for the justice of his cause. With the head thrown slightly backward, the figure holds with the left hand and arm the military hat and the bridle reins, and the other arm being extended perpendicularly, the right hand holds the sword exactly upright. The pose is heroic and dramatic. The spirit of the motive is admirably expressed in the action of the figure, and the head is noble and commanding in aspect. The horse (designed by Mr. Potter), with arched neck and lowered head, is a masterpiece of sculpture, and the splendid lines of construction and action, is imposing, and holds its proper place in the work, which is, as a whole, superlatively excellent in style. The pedestal was designed by Charles F. McKim, and is believed to be the ground to the head of the figure is about thirty feet.

The Washington chief of police has issued an order that no kodiacs are to be allowed in action during inauguration ceremonies, because he "does not propose to have the prominent men annoyed on all sides by having kodiacs hurled at their faces during the parade and afterwards." It has been guessed by some that the inauguration committee may want to give some photographs of the university for a consideration which will help defray expenses.

PROGRESS AT IOWA "U."

Iowa City, Iowa, Feb. 12.—The "U" of Iowa has made a remarkable growth in the last ten years. This is strikingly illustrated in a little folder just issued. In 1890 the instructional staff numbered seventy-four, now it numbers 132. Ten years ago there were 88 students, while the registration for the year 1900-1901 is 1,541. In facilities for teaching there has been a corresponding growth. The institution is growing steadily, each year being a little better than the previous. The attendance for this university will be over 1,600, a gratifying increase over last year's total—1,438.

BRYAN ONCE MORE

Plan to Nominate Him for President Again in 1894.

TRUSTS THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE

Chairman Jones Will Open the Campaign With a Trust Bill in the Next Congress.

New York, Feb. 12.—Projected movements for the reorganization of the democratic party have been abandoned by some of the leading gold democrats of this city because of advice from Washington that W. J. Bryan has already made arrangements for a third nomination for president and that his policy and platform for 1900 are to be created in advance by his friends in the United States senate. Senator Jones of Arkansas, chairman of the democratic national committee, is to lead the fight for a third nomination for Bryan. The paramount issue is to be war against "trusts" and capital.

The chairman of the national committee will introduce an antitrust bill as soon as the fifty-seventh congress is organized. The program is to keep this bill to the front, advocate it in and out of congress and use it as a means to revive the waning Bryan sentiment throughout the country.

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 12.—At a conference here of free silver democratic leaders, including W. J. Bryan, ex-Senator Towse, John J. Leutz, D. A. De Armond, ex-Governor Altgeld and Joseph E. Martin, the Jefferson-Jackson-Lincoln League, which heretofore has been merely a local organization, was expanded to a state and national affair. The conference of the national league will be held at Buffalo during the exposition, and a committee consisting of one member from each state was appointed to arrange for it. Norman E. Mack of Buffalo is expected to be chairman.

ONLY TWO MILD CASES

Smallpox Scarc at Iowa Falls Is Letting Down.

Iowa Falls, Iowa, Feb. 12.—The smallpox situation remains unchanged except that the excitement over the first discovery of the disease has subsided. There are but two cases and these are of a mild form and are quarantined in the pesthouse. All places where cases might develop from inoculation from the first case are strictly quarantined. As an extra precaution, the public schools were dismissed and the board for one week, in which time it can be ascertained whether or not the disease has gained a foothold.

Barrick of this city may be candidates for sheriff.

LINCOLN DAY EXERCISES

Patriotic Program Given by John F. Reynolds Post of Fargo.

Fargo, N. D., Feb. 12.—Lincoln Day was appropriately celebrated here last night by John F. Reynolds post, G. A. R. Addresses were made by Superintendent Smith of the city schools, and President West of the agricultural college. There were a number of patriotic recitations and songs.—E. F. Bruhn of Morris, Minn., has removed to Fargo and established a cigar factory.

A notorious woman, known as "Scotch Nell," is doing time in the city jail as the result of a recent debauch. She is said to have been on a drunk since early last fall, when she was arrested by Cavalry troops, with several hundred dollars and landed in East Grand Forks. Some charitable women are endeavoring to reform her.

There is a row over the action of the library committee in charging a membership fee of \$1, paid in advance, before books can be secured. The fund for the purchase of books will be available till next fall and the fee is charged to keep up current expenses. Taxpayers state if a levy is to be made and the library is to be a public institution the membership fee should be abolished. It is said to be contrary to the measure providing for public libraries.

DAMAGE SUIT BY HIBBARD HAS BEEN DROPPED.
