Ill health was the cause. GRANITE FALLS-The Pillsbury elevator was burned with 5,000 bushels of wheat, and the mill at the Milwaukee track, one loaded with wheat. SAUK CENTER-Not in many years have the farmers been so short of stock feed. Hay is selling readily at \$10 per ton, and very little is to be had. ALBERT LEA-Otto Schiemach was brought here from Madison, Iowa, on a charge of forgery. He had just completed a term in prison for the same offense. WINONA-A. P. Blagik, the newly appointed game warden for Winona county, called a meeting of the local residents and others who have been accustomed to fish with a seine, and informed them that he would arrest and prosecute any one found violating the law. NEW PAYNESVILLE-The Georgeville Creamery Association at its last meeting declared a dividend of 8 per cent upon its directors. A new and additional separator will be at once placed in the creamery building. A petition is being circulated asking that the question of the dissolution of the village of Fayetteville be submitted to the voters at the next annual election. DULUTH-The second annual meeting of the Canada-Atlantic Transit company was held here and the old directors re-elected. While S. P. Fullerton has not announced the names as yet, it is accepted in sportsman-political circles that John Green of Duluth and Archie Phillips of Tower will be named as deputies in this section. It is reported here that T. H. Lark, assistant general passenger agent of the South Shore, will on March 1, go with another company. A Duluth syndicate is being formed to develop oil lands in California. WISCONSIN. LA CROSSE-Five cases of smallpox have been discovered at St. Michael's orphan asylum for boys, in this city. Charles Radtke, an aged man employed by the city, was perhaps fatally injured in a runaway accident. CHIPPEWA FALLS-Mrs. E. L. Smith of Reeds Landing, Minn., has appealed to the police of this city to locate her 15-year-old daughter. She says a man named Elmer Thompson, and his wife took the girl on Jan. 28. WEST SUPERIOR-James T. Agen and present Postmaster C. C. Pillsbury seem to be the candidates for the place now held by the latter. The Trades and Labor Assembly came to the front with a big endorsement for Agen-Captain Harry W. Newton has been recommended for an appointment from this state in the new army. Rev. Frederick Knell Howard, pastor of the Church of the Redeemer, has been recommended for a chaplaincy. FIERRE-Miss Ulrika Heblund died at the Benedictine Sisters' hospital from the effects of burns received by pouring gasoline into a fire, supposing it was kerosene. Commander Lawrence has fixed the date for the next annual encampment of the state G. A. R., in Sioux Falls, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 4, 5 and 6. HURON-An examination of the applicants for appointment as cadet at the West Point military school will be held here Tuesday, Feb. 19. Under the reorganization of the army Lieutenant L. G. Fuller, of this city, is likely to receive a good appointment. Mr. Fuller has served in the regular army and was also a volunteer in the Cuban war.
