THE MERRIAM MEDAL

It Goes to Mr. Dunbar of St. Paul—McLeod Lost.

to the filter has its opening in the center of a dead sea in the lake and immediately adjacent to a point where the main sewer system was properly cared for, its effect upon the water would be decidedly cleansing; but it is not, all the pollution, filth and contamination of the city is poured into the homes of unsuspecting residents and used for drinking any culinary purposes. Physicians have repeatedly advised citizens to boil the water before using, but until many had died this advice went unheeded.

The filtration system which the water company is supposed to have been using is considered by experts to be the very best in the world. The original cost of putting in the system was \$30,000. The manager of the company is H. L. Benson, where the company has its main offices, with fever which he contracted here in Ashland.

Proceedings have been begun in circuit court by Attorney General Hicks, with a purpose to recall the company's franchise. The principal witness for the state is an ex-engineer of the company, who has stated publicly that the sand in the filters has not been changed in three years, and that for some time past the engineers have dug holes in the sand to let the water pass through. He says that the filters were so clogged with sediment that the digging of holes was absolutely necessary for the passage of the water. The prices charged by the company have been exorbitant, and this adds materially to the wrath of citizens.

When it is taken into consideration that the largest body of fresh water in the world lies within half a mile of Ashland, affording for the cities along its shores the purest, coolest and most wholesome supply, this condition of wholesale sickness is about sufficient, the citizens think, to cause the organization of a vigilance committee.

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CITIZENS ARE FIERCELY ANGRY

Twenty-two Deaths From Typhoid—Water Company to Be Prosecuted.

Ashland, Wis., Feb. 27.—Citizens of Ashland are in a state of excitement as the result of an analysis made on some sand taken from the filter used by the Ashland Water company for the purpose of clearing the water consumed by residents. The examination was made by Dr. H. L. Russell of the University of Wisconsin, a bacteriologist competent to perform such work, and entirely disinterested in the result. The report which Dr. Russell has made to the city authorities, who are collecting evidence to form a foundation for legal proceedings, has caused the strongest kind of denunciation of the company. After dwelling at length upon the preliminaries, Dr. Russell says: "White rats were also inoculated with broth cultures made from the respective samples of sand. The rats inoculated with scraped sand died in twenty-four hours."

This report, coming as it does at a time when hospitals are crowded to the very doors with typhoid fever patients; when every other home in the city has at least one and generally more patients; and after scores of citizens have attended funerals of their relatives and dear friends, has made the people fiercely angry.

The typhoid fever epidemic has had a three months' run and has caused twenty-two deaths. All told there have been 233 cases since January first, and the contagion is not in the least decreasing.

An examination of the filters at the pump house of the water company revealed the astounding fact that the sand which is used to purify the water has not been changed in three years, when it should be changed every month. It was a dose of this that killed the rat at Madison.
