DR. COOK'S ILLUSTRATED LECTURE COMES NEXT FRIDAY NIGHT.

"The South Pole," which is Dr. Cook's subject, is one of which few people are competent to speak, for few indeed are they who have ever struggled toward that pole. Dr. Cook was a member of the famous British expedition of 1900, an expedition which penetrated much farther into the antarctic ice packs than any other vessel.
