WARREN—John Wold, adjudged insane, was taken to the Fergus Falls asylum.  
WINTHROP—The People's Telephone company has been organized by business men and seventy phones will be installed at once.  
RED WING—The congregation of the German Lutheran church has extended a call to Rev. Mr. Springling, of Cotton Grove, to succeed Rev. C. Bender, deceased.  
WORTHINGTON—The store of H. E. Torrence & Brother, of this place, was entered and \$300 stolen from the safe, about \$250 of it in cash and \$150 in personal checks.  
ST. CLOUD—Fred Robinson, an inmate of the reformatory, who was sentenced from Hastings, attempted suicide in his cell. He took a quantity of strychnine and belladonna pills.  
LAKE NEBAGAMON—This place had a narrow escape from being burned out. Much hardware store burned and the flames threatened for a time to destroy everything in the town.  
LANESBORO—A new private bank, the Farmers and Mechanics, has opened its doors for business. The proprietors are Nelson Brothers, prominent for thirty years as merchants.  
GRAND MEADOW—G. Gutterston, has been here looking over the second rural mail route, which will be established soon. The length of the route will be twenty-five miles. Charles Nashold will be carrier and A. Moody substitute.  
KASSON—The residence of Jewel Whitney burned, with most of the furniture. There was \$1,500 insurance.—The bell fell off the schoolhouse, northeast. One of the pieces struck William Kennedy's little daughter, breaking her arm.  
ANOKA—Elmer Miller and James Hardy were in court yesterday to answer to the second indictment charging them with the murder of William J. Wise. County Attorney Pratt notified the case, and, on motion of G. H. Wymann, the defendant's attorney, the indictment was dismissed and the boys discharged.  
PRESTON—A special election has been called to vote bonds for the erection of a \$7,000 addition to the schoolhouse.—A hornet's nest has been stirred up by a sermon by Preston's reform preacher, in which he used language construed by some of his hearers as a condemnation of the actions and words of some of the lady teachers.  
WINONA—W. P. Cosgra, who has been trying to raise money orders, says his right name is O. D. Armstrong and that his folks resided at Zumbrota.—Mrs. W. F. Rogers, who spent the past year in the Philippines, has reached San Francisco on her way to this city.—The river is on the spring rampage. The water is rising rapidly and many of the low places are already flooded.  
CROOKSTON—The Montreal House, the oldest building in the city, was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$2,000; insurance, \$700. The guests and employes lost all their personal effects, amounting to several hundred dollars.  
FOLEY—Mrs. James Crowley, aged 99 years, is here under the doctor's care. She has a slight attack of grip, but otherwise is well and expects to see 100 years.—Tim Foley, of Foley Brothers, St. Paul, the wholesale dry goods merchant and the founder of the village of Foley, has put \$2,000 more into the courthouse fund, which makes \$15,000, a gift to the county, in case the county seat is located here.  
DELUATH—John Anderson, the smallpox guard in a camp at Hibbing, who, on Jan. 2, shot and killed Edward Bartlett, and who was indicted for murder in the second degree, was permitted to plead guilty to manslaughter in the second degree.—Two indictments were announced against Jacob Goldstein, the prisoner who shot Frank Magie, deputy sheriff. James Whalen was indicted for contributing to give the revolver to Goldstein with which he did the shooting.  
SEVEN BURNED TO DEATH.—Wellston, Ohio, March 19.—Jeff Hill, his wife and five children were burned to death in their log cabin northeast of Wellston, two miles from their nearest neighbor. A little yellow dog was the only thing that escaped.
