SCHEDULE NOT OFFICIAL  
That of the Western League Pub-lished Yesterday.  
George Tebus of Kansas City, says that the publication of the Western League playing schedule was decidedly premature and that W. P. Chase had no authority to promulgate the schedule as official. He says that Chase is permitted to make a draft to be submitted to President Hickey, who in turn should submit the same to the other members of the league for adop-tion, but not valuable. He takes the same position that was taken in these columns, that it is unwise to open the season in Minneapolis and St. Paul on May when Kansas City and St. Joseph are already in the league. It seems more than likely that Chase's plan will be materially changed before it is officially approved.

Realty in Minneapolis

There was a perceptible falling off in the trading of large properties during the week, following the unusual activity in-duced by the \$300,000 deal of Messrs. Pills-bury and Dayton with the Dayton block and some eighty-eight lots in the old Blaisdell property as chief factors in the trade. Mr. Dayton kept up his record, however, by buying the property at 715 Nicollet for \$45,500, a transaction, by the way, which was first mentioned in the Journal. The property was purchased by the Farmers and Mechanics Savings bank, which did not care to improve the valuable lot first mentioned in the Jour-nal's intention to improve the property at once, as the building is a small, three-story brick affair that has seen better days. Dayton will in all probability erect a six or seven-story building in its stead during the coming season.

A Fair Inquiry.  
The demand for small properties, well improved, continues good, and there has been a fair inquiry for desirable vacant lots during the week. While dealers are disposed to take a pessimistic view of the vacant lot proposition, they admit that there are more inquiries than ever before. The trouble with many dealers is that they are too impatient, and are more concerned in making one big deal, which means a tidy commission, than in making quick sales and small profits off of vacant lots. The smaller dealers, some of whom have a little more patience and are willing to put up houses or cottages for the right kind of buyers, are doing very nicely and are not making much fuss about it either.

Walter L. Badger has had great success in his real estate work. He has been thrust upon him in a rather unpleasant manner lately. He informed a reporter for an esteemed contemporary that if he could get good tenants he might erect a large warehouse on Third avenue N. be-tween Third and Fourth streets. Imme-diate the young man posted off and had Mr. Badger erecting the building and told him to be ready for occupancy this fall, although Mr. Badger had no idea of such a thing. The original figure named in the young man's article was \$30,000, a mis-statement which was further aggravated by the morning issue of the same paper when the types made the cost of Mr. Badger's warehouse \$300,000. Mr. Badger feels that his young reportorial friend is "shaking off" with his colleague on another morning paper who recently erected a \$2,000,000 office building "in our midst."

Edmund G. Walton reports a happy state of things on Lowry hill. This prop-erty has risen rapidly in value during the past few months, and continues on the high ground. Several large and fine build-ing sites were recently secured from the market entirely, but it is not known at what price they would be sold. Stevens avenue, of 1515 Stevens ave-nue, has in a new low in value, and will be first-class, modern flats, beauti-fully located near the Nicollet avenue car line.
