

MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE GETS HARD KNOCKS WHICH ARE ENOUGH TO MAKE THEM WALK AWAY

The Uniform Text-Book Bill Opposed by Educators. HARD TO HARMONIZE SCHOOLS Especially Those of the City and the Country—Itasca County Wants Money.

Some hard raps were given the uniform text book bill by several well-known educators, at the public hearing on the bill this afternoon. There was hardly a section in the measure that appealed to them, and while their objections were couched in temperate words, it was plain that all considered the whole proposition undesirable and impracticable.

One of the objections was that a uniform series of books for urban and rural schools is quite impossible, the requirements of the two classes of schools being so different owing to the different lengths of the school year.

A fear was also expressed that the low price placed on the books supplied by the text book commission would result in the purchase of inferior works. It was claimed that no commission could keep step with the progressive publishing houses with their modern methods and ideas.

Might Become a Cog. It was also suggested that the text book commission might degenerate into a part of the political machinery. That it would be somewhat influenced seemed inevitable.

Among those agitating against the bill are Doctor Jordan, superintendent of the Minneapolis schools; Superintendent DeWitt of the Duluth schools; and former State Superintendent Lewis, and many county superintendents.

Money for Murder Trials. Early in the session a bill to reimburse Itasca county in \$4,000 for expenses incurred in prosecuting a murder case was introduced. The bill was advanced as was that the killer and the killed were nonresidents.

Stan Donnelly's Claim. Falling to get satisfaction anywhere else, "Stan" Donnelly has come to the legislature to get a special fee from the state game and fish commission for defending Deputy Game Warden E. P. Corbett, who shot a Foxglove pheasant.

Draws on the Minnesota. Navigation on the Minnesota river is to be preserved through a bill offered by Senator Benedict. It provides that all bridges constructed below St. Peter must have draws so as not to interfere with the river traffic.

Bill Affecting Senate. Instead of foisting a brand new senate upon the public every four years, Senator Tolp proposed to arrange elections so that only half the senators will be elected at one time.

Dunn's Election Bill. The senate adopted the report of the committee on elections recommending the passage of Representative Dunn's primary election bill. The bill has been made a special order for Thursday at 11 a. m.

S. F. 458, Benedict—To amend section 1918, statutes of 1894, relating to the erection of bridges over the Minnesota river. Federal relations.




