RUSSIA'S WAR FUND

According to Some Estimates It is as Much as \$4,000,000,000.

CZAR IS ITS ABSOLUTE MASTER

"Holy Gold Fund" Has Been Growing for Years and It is Still Increasing.

New York Sun Special Service.

New York, March 25.—Russia generally is looked upon as a "hard up" nation, always hovering on the verge of bankruptcy, and the state of her finances is pointed to as a reason why she will not seek a fight with another nation. Russia, however, says the Press, has one great source of supply, whence she can draw gold enough to furnish all the "sineas of war" needed.

The "holy gold fund" is one of the mysteries of the great northern empire. With it, some students of Russian affairs say, she can afford better to incur the enormous expenditure of a campaign than Germany, Austria or France. It is said to be the largest secret gold deposit on earth, some estimates placing the amount as high as \$4,000,000,000.

In comparison with this enormous sum, the \$30,000,000 which Germany has stowed away against a time of trouble in the vaults of the Castle of Spandau, sinks into insignificance. Though the czar is master of this great war chest, he himself probably does not know just how much it contains. The fund has been piling up for many years and is increasing quietly every day.

Nihilists Fight

Cry of Spies Started a Row at a Meeting in New York.

New York, March 25.—A meeting of Russians last night at a hall on Henry street to form plans for aiding the nihilists in St. Petersburg, broke up in wild disorder after a fight in which at least half a dozen were injured.

When the police were appointed to call a mass meeting to raise funds for the nihilists, some one shouted: "Down with the spies. Throw them out."

"Kill the spies," chanted a dozen others. A man near the door struck a man near him in the face with his fist. His victim retaliated and this started a general scrimmage. Wild shouts and yells in various languages were heard, and people began an onslaught on others for no apparent reason. Some fought with chairs and others with fists.

"Out with the spies," shouted a voice, and three or four people were promptly thrown down by the police.

Three Bulgarian Families Killed and a Village Said to Have Been Burned.

Constantinople, March 25.—According to private advices from Macedonia, a band of Turks massacred three Bulgarian families, men, women and children, in the village of Agmalah, near Seres, a town forty-seven miles northeast of Salonica.

It is reported that a village near Monastir, in Macedonia, with a mixed population of Musulmans and Bulgarians, has been burned.

HERD OF "WHITE DEER"

Hunter in New York Will Try to Capture Them.

Diana, N. Y., March 25.—Tippecanoe Knapp, hunter and guide, who lives near Indian river in the woods near this settlement, came face to face recently with a great buck, whose coat was almost white. It was one of the "white" deer, regarding which so many tales have been told. A few paces distant were a 2-year-old buck and a doe of the same age, also white except a red streak along the back; a roan colored doe and two fawns, all as white as the buck. The animals were in a "yard."

As soon as the buck saw Knapp, he gave a snort of alarm and the herd dashed away.

The following morning, accompanied by his brother-in-law, Stephen Briggs, and Ralph Grant, a wood chopper, Knapp returned to the "yard." When the men were sighted the deer started through the woods, led by the great buck. They will make another attempt to capture one of the white animals.

DOWN AN EMBANKMENT

Five Persons on a Wis. Cent. Train Injured Near Chippewa Falls.

Chippewa Falls, Wis., March 25.—The Wisconsin Central short line passenger train, returning from Eau Claire, ran into a washout last night, one mile south of the city. Two coaches, constituting the train went down a thirty-foot embankment and were badly damaged.

Five people were injured. Conductor Roy Miller, wrist hurt; Brakeman Lee Thomas, eye injured; Gilbert Moorhead, Eau Claire, leg injured; Mrs. John Anderson, Chippewa Falls, badly bruised. None was seriously injured.
