MINNESOTA LEGISLATURE

GET THEM BACK

Taxes Paid in Excess of Cost of City Improvements.

A BILL BY SNYDER PROPOSES IT

Many Thousands of Dollars Involved and Much Work for Public Officials.

Senator Snyder's bill requiring the proper authorities in cities of over 50,000 to refund taxes for special improvements in excess of the cost of such improvements will make work for Hennepin county and Minneapolis officials. It becomes a law. The senator secured unanimous consent to give the bill its second and third readings and it was passed by a vote of 17 to 10. The bill is in line with the decision of Judge Pond in the suit to enforce the collection of special taxes against John S. Pillsbury. The latter resisted the collection of taxes on the ground that he had been assessed for a sewer on Pleasant avenue at a rate much in excess of the actual cost of the improvement. He won, and Judge Pond's decision has been sustained by the supreme court.

FUND FAR TOO SMALL

SAYS P.-A. EXPO COMMISSION

Its Members Think Minnesota Should Spend at Least \$50,000 at Buffalo.

H. P. Hall, Alexander McDougall and John Morton, Minneapolis commissioners of the Pan-American Exposition, returned this morning from Buffalo convinced that Minnesota's appropriation is quite inadequate and that the interests of the state demand an expenditure of \$50,000 for an exhibit and a building. In support of this position they have made a report to Governor Van Sant. Messrs. Hall and Morton addressed the house this morning, urging that the magnitude of the exhibition made it necessary for Minnesota to make a good showing.

MUST HAVE MR. PETERSON

THE DEMAND OF MR. WASHBURN

Still No Meeting of Bribery Investigation Committee Called—Whitford Says "No Whitewash."

No meeting of the investigation committee was announced to-day. Mr. Washburn says he is ready to appear before the committee at any time, but that he will not testify unless a committee of five is permitted to appear as his attorney and conduct his examination and that of other witnesses summoned in regard to his statement. The majority of the committee will oppose the plan, but under the rules laid down in Cushing's Manual, any member so desiring may appear before such a committee to examine witnesses. The Minnesota legislature has permitted witnesses to be represented by attorneys, and if the committee refuses to admit Mr. Peterson it will go directly against rules and precedents.

Insane Hospital Problem.

Senator Schaller's bill, appropriating \$200,000 for new buildings at Hastings insane asylums provoked a spirited debate. The passage of the bill would mean the abandonment of the "cottage plan," which is now generally advocated by all authorities on the treatment of the insane. The bill provides that the council must take advantage of the act within six months of its passage.

For Exemption of Cotteles.

Senator Hayes presented a bill intended to exempt cotteles from the operation of the bill. The point was made that this product is not a substitute for lard, but is manufactured and sold on its own merits.

That Pine County Bill.

The special committee appointed to investigate Representative Pope's bill, authorizing the commissioners of Pine county to issue certificates of indebtedness for certain road work, will report in favor of the measure. Senator McKusick opposed the bill on the floor of the senate yesterday. The measure was passed by a vote of 17 to 10.

Side-Path Commissioners Go.

Horton's bicycle path bill was passed yesterday by the senate. The bill authorizes county commissioners having 50,000 or more inhabitants to appoint side-path commissioners to collect a license over cycle paths and the way to Minneapolis, which has an ordinance to the same effect.

REVOLVING FUND BILL

A Modification of Former Bill is Introduced.

Senator Potter has called a meeting of the committee on municipal corporations for next Friday noon. All civil service bills now before the committee will be reported. Persons interested in any of these reform measures are expected to be present.

Temperance Measures Friday.

The Halvorson bill prohibiting "blind pigs," "cold storage plants" and "club rooms" or other devices from evading the liquor laws in temperance towns is a special order in the senate for Friday, 2:30 p. m. The Jepsen bill providing for county option will also be considered at the same time.

Fire at Oak Park

Residence of Vital Albert Burned—Nethaway's Candidacy. Special to The Journal.

Stillwater, Minn., March 27.—The residence of Vital Albert in Oak Park was burned last night. Loss on building, \$1,000; on furniture, \$150. The insurance nearly covers the loss.

CLAIMS AGAINST SPAIN

Total is \$30,000,000—Five for Over a Million. Washington, March 27.—The Spanish war claims commission has received from the state department a list of the claims against Spain, growing out of the insurrection in Cuba. These claims are all those of American citizens. The total is \$30,000,000 and new claims are in excess of a million dollars.

DEATH OF E. S. McCaughey

Prominent at Sioux City and a Relative of Stevenson. Sioux City, Iowa, March 27.—Elijah S. McCaughey, a brother-in-law of former Vice President Adlai E. Stevenson, and a prominent citizen of this city, is dead, aged 80. A widow and four daughters, the latter wives of prominent business and professional men of this city and Chicago, survive him.

CASH DRAWER ROBBED

Iowa Savings Bank Vault Was Burglarized. Cedar Rapids, Iowa, March 27.—The Savings bank at Riverside was broken into early to-day. The burglars drilled through the steel doors of the vault, but the inner safe resisted their efforts. They secured only small sums from the cash drawer and escaped on a handcar towards Iowa City.

The publication will be neatly bound and attractively finished and will be filled with anecdotes and stories of the class from the time of its entrance into college until the day of graduation. The class this year numbers about thirty-five and is an exceptionally strong and aggressive body.

Blind Man Elopes

Mad Infatuation of a Kimball, S. D., Restaurant Keeper. Kimball, S. D., March 27.—Totally blind, married for twenty-four years, the father of children and a prosperous restaurant keeper, B. Coffee of this place has eloped with his wife's sister, Mrs. Clara Richards, a married woman with a family of grown children, who recently came from San Francisco on a visit to the family here. The sister had been here but a short time before the wife became aware that improper relations existed between the visitor and her husband and ordered her sister from the house.

SUGAR WAR IS SETTLED

Both Will Continue to Handle Sugar and Coffee—Agree on Price. Toledo, O., March 27.—The suit in the supreme court of Ohio between Arbutckles and the American Sugar Refining company, the blade says, will be withdrawn. It is said, and the bitter fight between the two companies will be ended. Both will continue to handle sugar and coffee, and the price will be governed entirely by the price of the raw material. The Woolson Spice company's plant in this city will not be closed.
