LAST OF THE FIVE GONE
FRANK BLACK HAWK IS DEAD

Implied With Holy Track, Ireland, Cadotte and Defender in Spicer Family Murder.

Special to The Journal.
Fort Yates, N. D., March 28.—Frank Black Hawk, whose name was so prominently connected with the Spicer murders two years ago, died yesterday of paralysis. He was unconscious for some days before his death, and made no statement concerning the murders to anyone.

Black Hawk would undoubtedly have been lynched with Holy Track, Ireland and Cadotte; only he was confined in the Bismarck jail at the time instead of at Willamsport. He never ventured across the Missouri river after the murders. Holy Track and Ireland claimed that Black Hawk planned the murders, although it was never definitely stated he was present. Since the murders Black Hawk had been a steady attendant at the congregational church. He was half negro and half Indian.

Of the five men implicated in the terrible massacre, all are now dead. Three—Holy Track, Ireland and Cadotte—were lynched, Defender died a few months afterwards of consumption, and now Black Hawk has gone.

REDUCE THE ARMY
Root and Corbin Are Making Plans for the Philippines.

New York, March 28.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: "The long time that General Corbin will go to the Philippines, and at present there is no reason why Secretary Root should not go. It is possible they may start earlier than was at first proposed. General Corbin said that General MacArthur would be succeeded in command at Manila by General Chaffee June 30, and the general secretary of war earnestly desired to be in the Philippines before this transfer is made. It is expected that about the same date the Taft commission will transfer the reins of government completely from soldiers to civilians.

When the military rule is superseded by civil government the process of reducing the strength of the army in the Philippines from 60,000 to 40,000 will be begun. General Corbin says that the army when completely reorganized will consist of more than 70,000 or 80,000 men, instead of the 100,000 authorized.
