TO TRAIN AT KIRKSVILLE

MINNEAPOLIS FIRST IN THE FIELD

Only Western League Team to Have Southern Training-Holiday Dates Here.

Kirkville, Mo., will be the training place for the millers this season, and by Friday they will all be on hand to take off weight, "cut out" easy living and begin hard work on athletes' diet. The millers will be the first team to report this season and moreover will be the first team to train in the south, two distinctions which indicate very plainly that President Beall will not overlook a single point which will make his men a bunch of winners. He was urged by the university athletes to get his players into condition in Minneapolis, but as no one here not even T. S. Stram would give an answer as to the weather, he determined to take the team south. It may be a needless expense, for none of the rival magnates will go to that expense, but he wants to make a good start.

Beall Understands.

Right here it may be emphasized that President Beall is keenly awake to the situation and he purposes to give fast and clean ball in Minneapolis, as he is fully aware that it is the only article which will be patronized and if it is not the real thing, the fans will not come. That is why the western association of last year was no slow league is evident when it is learned that it developed as many men for the National League as the American league although having only six clubs. While many of the new millers are unknown to the Minneapolis fans it will take a great while to get acquainted. That they are a fast lot may be seen from a perusal of the new spring guides which are already out.

Being first-class ball towns, and likely to draw big crowds, Minneapolis and St. Paul will get all the holiday dates in the season. Not only will the twins have Decoration day and the Fourth of July at home, but also Labor day with a series of week-end games. It will be as if they were here until about the middle of May, as the weather is a little too uncertain to take any chances.

An evidence of Mr. Beall's thoroughness was seen in his training rules, a typewritten copy of which has been handed to each player with instructions that they must be implicitly obeyed. The rules are as follows:

Rules for Players.

Train at least one and a half hours in the morning and two hours in the afternoon, as near the same time each day as possible; should have at least one day entire rest in seven; must be fresh at any time; no coffee; Breakfast—Some kind of grain; oatmeal, cracked wheat, toast or crackers; if a coffee drinker, as much coffee as needed for breakfast, but at no other time of day; weak tea; whenever wanted; milk, if fresh, at all times, but never over one pint at a meal. Should not eat veal, pork, greasy potatoes, fresh bread, gray, syrup; as little sugar as possible. No pie or cake, except apple pie; food cake; no pie or pudding or hot cakes; potatoes must always be well cooked.

Luncheon—Cold roast, stale bread, plenty of fish cooked any way, but not greasy; weak tea or milk; plenty of fruit, except bananas or pineapple, which two fruits should always be eaten after all work of the day. Stewed prunes at least once every two days.

Dinner (or last meal of the day)—Allow no lunching after this meal; if a smoker, must smoke immediately after meals, as it is less harmful; good medium, or rare, steak, or mutton, either chops, roast or stew; wild game, well cooked, fish at any time; no coffee, but weak tea or milk; cocoa or chocolate should not be used at any time; vegetable or grain soup at dinner.

NO MORE MINISTERS

Nicaragua Will Discontinue Its Foreign Legations.

SAVE MONEY AND PAY DEBTS

Frenchmen Think It Means That Hope of a Nicaraguan Canal Is Given Up.

Paris, April 1.—The Nicaraguan government has suppressed its legations in London and Paris, and at the end of April it purposes to do the same in Washington. Thereafter, Nicaragua will have no diplomatic corps anywhere. The president of Nicaragua, General Santos J. Zelaya, has written his friends in Paris that this course has been taken from motives of economy and to help the government to pay the coupons on the foreign debt already due, but the payment of which has been postponed until the consummation of the sale of the Panama canal.

New York, April 1.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: While M. Hulest president of the French Panama Canal company, has been awaiting the participation of Colombia in the negotiations for the sale of the Panama canal to the United States, M. Bruna Barillon, formerly an engineer of the company, who says he represents some of the stockholders, has indicated to the isthmian canal commission that the company is willing to sell its concession and property. M. Hulest has contended that under the concession the grant will be subject to forfeiture from the moment negotiations begin for its sale, and such negotiations had the approval of the Colombian government. It was, therefore, impossible for him to submit a proposition for the sale of the concession to the United States, as required by the isthmian canal commission.

WHOLE VILLAGES BURIED

LANDSLIDES CAUSED BY RAIN

Italian Towns Destroyed, but the People in Most Cases, Escape.

Rome, April 1.—The part of the night of unceasing rain has caused repeated landslides from the Apennines, whole villages being destroyed. The town of Vaglio, with 5,000 inhabitants, was buried a few days ago by an enormous mass of earth. Chiampio, another town of 4,000 inhabitants, is seriously threatened, but owing to the slow movement of the avalanche the inhabitants in both these cases had time to escape and remove most of their household goods. The damage is, however, immense, and the loss of life has been by no means small.

TO DEVELOP INDIA

British Syndicate Will Establish Extensive Enterprises.

London, April 1.—To save the Indian empire from commercial annexation by rival trading nations is the object of the India Development Syndicate, Limited, the new British concern just organized with \$2,500,000 (\$2,500,000) capital. Chief among the schemes in view are sugar plantations and refineries in the province of Behar, steel and iron works, railway equipment, factories and cotton mills. The valuable oil lands in upper Burma will be worked. A prominent Anglo-Indian capitalist said that these cases had time to escape and remove most of their household goods. According to the man's friends, the direct cause of his insanity has been a long strain of overwork. When to that was added the destruction in an hour of all the results of that work Wulfram's mind gave way. Wulfram was formerly a cowboy out west, but he preferred cow sketching to cow punching. His hobby was to draw animals. He went to Paris to study. A friend of the family said that his father lives in Duluth and his sister in Kansas.

SCARES THE SULTAN

Earthquake Causes a Panic at a Ceremony at Constantinople.

Constantinople, April 1.—Yesterday's earthquake was felt in the Dolmabahatche palace at the moment of the Bairan ceremony, when the high officials were passing before the sultan's throne. A panic resulted, particularly among the diplomatic corps in the gallery and the plaster fell from the ceiling and portions of the chandeliers were broken. The sultan rose from his throne and took a few steps, but at a moment's hesitation he reseated himself upon the throne and ordered the ceremony to proceed.

JESOP PLANT IN THIS COUNTRY

Sheffield Steel Company Will Build Works for American Trade.

New York, April 1.—S. J. Robinson, managing director of W. J. Jesop & Sons, limited, of Brightside works, Sheffield, England, has arrived to locate the plant which the English concern proposes erecting in the United States. Mr. Robinson said: "We are going to build a plant on this side principally to escape the tariff of some \$75 a ton which the United States government imposed on crucible steel. Our new works will be in the vicinity of Pittsburgh. The plant will employ 500 men."

COAL DOCK FOR LAKE LINDEEN.

Calumet, Mich April 1.—Work on the new coal dock of Etrier of Lake Linden will be commenced at once, the contract having been let to John P. Richards. The dock will be about 220 feet long. A coal shed 100x30 feet will be erected upon it and about 4,000 tons of coal will be received during the coming season, enabling the residents of Lake Linden to get their fuel much cheaper.—Several school teachers in Calumet are applying for positions in the Philippines.
