CHARGE CAUSES A CHICAGO RIOT

Four Men Are Accused of Collecting Money From 300 on a Promise of Work.

Chicago, April 10.—Three hundred angry Greeks, many of them armed with knives and revolvers, besieged four men in a building at 247 Polk street for several hours last night. Stones were hurled through the windows. The police rescued the four men, who are alleged to have collected \$3,000 belonging to the members of the crowd.

IT LOOKS LIKE A DEAL

J. J. HILL'S PLANS ARE MATURING

If His Combination Goes Through It Will Be Tough on Some Roads.

New York, April 10.—If there is any truth in the old adage that where there is an abundance of smoke there must be a little fire, then there are the best of reasons for giving credence to the stories regarding the Northern Pacific-Burlington-Erie deal, which Messrs. J. J. Hill and J. Pierpont Morgan are trying to perfect.

The most persistent rumors regarding these various properties still dominate topics of conversation in Wall street. It is even asserted that Mr. Hill has indicated his friends that he regards the deal as settled, but that the details must be submitted for Mr. Morgan's approval.

The Northern Pacific and Burlington established new high records on the stock exchange yesterday. It is generally understood that the deal is completed, and that the only cause for a delay in the formal announcement of it is a difference of opinion in regard to certain details in connection with the payment. There is no hitch, however, as reported. Burlington stock will be paid for partly in cash and partly in new 2 1/2 per cent bonds. It is figured that after Burlington refunding is accomplished and improved methods of operation are introduced by Mr. Hill, the company could afford to lose 10 per cent of its gross earnings and still meet its obligations.

INTO SIOUX CITY

Great Western Will Surely Reach the Iowa Town This Year.

Special to The Journal. Sioux City, April 10.—The Tribune says: The Chicago Great Western railroad will be constructed into Sioux City this year.

RIGHT-OF-WAY SUITS

North-Western Backs Down in the McGehegan Case in Iowa.

Mason City, Iowa, April 10.—The Chicago & North-Western has withdrawn its motion for the supreme court in the McGehegan case and ordered the judgment of the court paid, \$3,300 and interest, amounting to \$3,644, and costs. This was one of the damage suits against the North-Western for right-of-way in which the sheriff's jury awarded \$3,000 which the plaintiff refused.

The McGehegan case was undoubtedly opened for trial and to prevent similar action by others along the right-of-way and the only other case of importance was that of the Parker estate which was awarded more than \$8,000. This will be fought in the courts to the bitter end.

An Official's View.

A northwestern traffic official of a Minneapolis-Chicago line, in touch with financial affairs, has the following to say regarding the proposed deal:

If the Hill-Morgan-Burlington deal is consummated, it will place all but the Burlington in a peculiar predicament. We do a large business with the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, giving them about as much as they give us, and these two roads divert all their east-bound business to them all their west-bound business to them all our west-bound traffic.

It appears to me that all of the St. Paul-Chicago lines will stand hard hit and will suffer if this plan is to be carried out.

It appears to me that unless the present arrangement for the change of traffic with all Chicago-St. Paul lines is continued, a vast amount of business that now goes over the Great Northern and Northern Pacific to the coast will be diverted to the central and southern lines, as the Rock Island, Illinois Central, North-Western, Milwaukee and Chicago Great Western would then have a much longer haul to coast line connections and a fair division of traffic.

Home-seekers Still Coming.

The movement of home-seekers this week is not as heavy as last week, and other weeks since the low colonists' rates were inaugurated. However, both the Northern Pacific and Great Northern were obliged to run their coast trains in two sections to accommodate the crowds.

Railroad Notes.

President J. J. Hill is expected home from New York Friday.

The Omaha will make extensive and important improvements on its St. Paul-Duluth line this summer.

George J. Gould and some of his Missouri Pacific associates, including Russell Sage, have bought the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad.

An agreement between the Standard Trust company of New York and the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, providing for an issue of equipment obligations to cover \$10,000,000 of additional equipment, was filed to-day.

President A. E. Stewart, of the projected Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad, confirmed a dispatch from Chihuahua, Mexico, stating that a contract had been let for the construction of the road between this city and San Angelo, Texas, a distance of 500 miles.

FOODS FOR STOCK

Alfalfa Will Grow on Raw Prairie—Other Plants. Special to The Journal. Rapid City, S. D., April 10.—One of the topics of conversation among the cattlemen who attended the association meeting in this city was how to replenish the grass on the ranges. In many portions of the

Hills the grass has been so closely eaten that cattle cannot keep fat. George Bucklough, who owns a large area of upland cattle range on Rapid creek, east of this city, said he had found by experiment that alfalfa will grow luxuriantly when sowed on the raw prairie land. Last year he sowed twenty acres, first going over the ground twice with a tooth harrow and once after the seed had been sown, he had

an enormous crop of the grass. Other ranchers in that part of the range had similar experiences.

Spelt is another new grass that will be sowed extensively in the Hills this spring. Cattlemen and ranchers have sent east for small sample packages of a new stock food called soy bean. This plant takes the place of clover in western states. It grows a crop in four months and is looked upon

as one of the greatest stock foods in existence. The cattlemen of the Hills are eager for some sort of a grass that will mature into hay for winter use; something that will be sure against a dry season. Last fall it was almost impossible to get enough hay for range cattle, and had the winter been a severe one, the loss of cattle would have been great. Alfalfa has been the most successful plant, for the

reason, perhaps, that it has been experimented with.

No Loss in Enthusiasm. Fargo, N. D., April 10.—There was an enthusiastic meeting of the executive committee of the Fargo Fire Festival Association last night, at which many plans were suggested.
