

SOUTH DAKOTA
BRIDGEWATER—The Woodmen will erect
a public hall and lodgeroom, to cost about
\$3,200.
ALPENA—Robert E. Dye has purchased the
Journal from Ernest M. Cochran and will
conduct it in future.
MONROE—Several persons are figuring on
building a hotel at Monroe. The present
hotel accommodations are inadequate.
VERMILION—Deputy Sheriff Whitehead
has taken Clarence Klancy and Vilah Mei-
rose to the penitentiary for one and two
years, respectively.
BRITTON—During the month of March, an
aggregate of 3,375 acres of farm lands were
transferred in Marshall county for a total
consideration of \$86,000.
HOWARD—Work upon the new water-
works system, for which the voters recently
authorized the issuance of \$10,000 in bonds,
will soon be commenced.
HIGHMORE—Highmore expects a building
boom this summer owing to the scarcity of
houses. At present there is not a vacant
dwelling-house in the place.

MADISON—The University of Wisconsin
will have an educational exhibit at the Pan-
American exposition.—John J. Suh, presi-
dent of the German-American bank, died last
evening, aged 65.
MARINETTE—The school board last night
decided to prohibit football in the public
schools. Resolutions were passed prohibiting
the game. A resolution prohibiting dancing
in the public school was also adopted.
PLAINFIELD—The remains of Mrs. Rose
Olson of Nekeoska were brought to Plainfield
for burial.—Miss Louise Thomas, daughter
of Harvey Thomas of Edgerton, Wis., and
Adelbert Tullar of this town were married.
WEST SUPERIOR—Deputy Treasurer Joel
S. Gates has resigned his position to go with
the Bank of Commerce. He will be succeeded
by Frank Kenyon. Harry Linton, with the
Bank of Commerce, goes with the First Na-
tional Bank.—More people are expected to
visit Superior this summer than at any pre-
vious time in the history of the city.

IOWA
GRINNELL—The death of J. J. Russell of
Jefferson occurred yesterday. He was one of
the prominent lawyers of the state.
DES MOINES—Governor Shaw and other
Des Moines men interested in 2,400 acres of
rice land near Beaumont, Texas, received an
offer of \$25,000 for it Thursday.
WATERLOO—The convention of the Iowa
retail grocers will be held here April 22-27.
A mammoth pavilion for the pure food dis-
play is now in course of erection.
OTTUMWA—Peter Crips, proprietor of a
livery stable, and Bert Houston, a cab driver,
were probably fatally stabbed by gamblers
who were celebrating heavy winnings. Six
were arrested.
HAWARDEN—The 5-year-old son of G. W.
McCormick was attacked by a bulldog and
two greyhounds belonging to a neighbor, and
was chewed and lacerated about the arms,
limbs and neck.
CEDAR RAPIDS—The trial of George Peetz,
cashier for E. E. Miner, charged with the
murder of William Higginson on the night
of Jan. 12, began yesterday. A jury has not
been secured and a special venire may be
necessary.
SIOUX CITY—The dismissal by the Iowa
supreme court of the appeal of the suit of
the state against the defunct Fidelity Loan
and Trust company of Sioux City, means that
the stockholders in the concern will be sub-
ject to liability.
ROCK VALLEY—One of the largest land
sales in the history of this section was con-
ducted by C. H. Cassell, Harry Cable
and P. A. Orveth of Hudson buying of
J. H. Blatherwick a 400-acre farm lying six
miles southeast. The consideration was \$52,500
an acre.
