Master Builders So Decide This Afternoon.

BE EFFECTIVE AT ONCE

Work by Union Carpenters to Stop To-night.

CASH AND DOOR MEN'S PLANS

They May All Disperse With the Union Label-Carpenters' Position Defined.

There will not be a carpenter among all the 300 or more in the employ of the Master Builders' association at work Monday morning.

The carpenters on their part at their meeting last night voted with a single dissenting voice to hold steadfastly to the rules of their own organization.

Carlin Hopes.

Phil Carlin, secretary of the Building Trades Council, still hopes for an amicable settlement.

"I look for a general strike," said he this afternoon, following the announcement of the result of the association's meeting.

"The order affects all alike. We will pick up men where we can and get along as best we can. Fortunately, there is no very pressing work on hand among our members.

A report is current in building circles that all sash and door manufacturers of the city have signed an agreement to disperse with the label of the Woodworkers' union after May 1.

Woodworkers Meet To-night. A meeting of the woodworkers' organization will be held this evening to discuss the question of wages already raised, also the nine-hour provision.

Sash and Door Men to Meet. The owners have no organization of any kind, but all those operating shops are willing to meet their employes for the discussion of any question of mutual interest.
