Iowa City, Iowa, April 16.—Associate Dean Charles Noble Gregory of the Wisconsin law school, to-day accepted the chancellorship of the Iowa law school superseding Judge Emlin McClain. Mr. Gregory comes from a family of lawyers; he is a man of broad culture, with administrative ability, and has had experience in law school work, and is unexcelled as a teacher. He comes here because there is a field for great future work, the Iowa law school being considered the best in the country. His salary will be \$4,000, the same as that of a judge of the supreme court. His acceptance was received with great enthusiasm by the students when President MacLean made the announcement.

SCHOOL BILL VETOED. Governor Dockery Says It Savors of Paternalism.

Jefferson City, Mo., April 16.—Governor Dockery has vetoed the compulsory education bill. It provided for transient or parental schools and attendance officers in cities of 10,000 population or more, and prohibited the employment of children during school hours.

He says: "It will take all of two years for me to come anywhere near complying with the expectations of my friends here and to that end I expect to devote the whole of my time."
