THE WEATHER

Minnesota—Generally fair to-night and Thursday; northwest winds, becoming variable. Wisconsin—Fair to-night and Thursday; cooler in east portion to-night; fresh northwest winds. Iowa—Generally fair to-night and Thursday; generally fair in the morning, and thence gradually fair to-night and Thursday; variable winds.

Weather Conditions. There has been a decided fall in temperature since yesterday morning in Minnesota and North Dakota and thence south and southwestward, the changes being 16 degrees to 18 degrees in southern Minnesota and 26 degrees in Oklahoma and northern Texas. The temperature is rising in Montana and Washington and thence northward. There has been precipitation during the past twenty-four hours in the lake region, the south half of Minnesota, the middle Mississippi valley and in New Mexico, Oklahoma and northern Texas. The pressure is low in the lake region and in the west gulf region and relatively high on the Atlantic coast and in the Rocky mountain region.

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CUDAHYS WILL COME

Minneapolis Would Like to See Them at New Brighton. The Cudahys intend to locate a branch packing-house in the vicinity of the twin cities in no longer doubt. St. Paul people claim to have advice confirming the report printed in yesterday's Journal. In an interview at Omaha Edward Cudahy is quoted as saying that his brothers, John and Patrick, had practically concluded to enter the northwest. He admitted that his brothers had been conducting negotiations with President Flower of the Union Stock Yards company.

ST. PAUL IS FULLY AROUSED. Every Effort Will Be Made to Get the New Plant in St. Paul. The prospect of the Cudahys locating in the northwest has been a matter of general discussion among many Minneapolis business men to-day. They consider it a good matter for the business men of the city to concentrate their energy on the active work which will be done in connection with the new plant at New Brighton such as would be installed by the Cudahys would mean a big increase in business for Minneapolis. It is estimated that this increase in money transactions would amount to at least \$5,000,000 annually. All of this business would pass through the local banks and would indirectly benefit every class of trade and business in the city.

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A POTATONE HONORED

The imperial potatone and a great mass of the tourists fell in with the parade, carriages being provided for the ladies and the nobles who preferred to ride.

TALKED OF OUR POETS. CHARLES E. RUSSELL OF CHICAGO. He Was Formerly a Minneapolis Newspaper Man—Now "Publisher" Chicago American. Mr. and Mrs. John N. Greer entertained the Travelers and their friends last evening at their residence, 2625 Pleasant avenue. Charles E. Russell of Chicago, a brother of Mrs. Greer, addressed the club on "American Poets and Poetry." Mr. Russell is "publisher" of Hearst's Chicago American. Sixteen years ago he was a newspaper man in Minneapolis and managing editor of The Journal. Later he went to Detroit. He made a record in the famous Railway, N. J., murder mystery, as a reporter for the New York World, at a time when the detectives were completely baffled. Before going to Chicago Mr. Russell was managing editor of the New York Journal. Mr. Russell will be well remembered by the older newspaper men of the city as the "Pork and Poetry Editor" of the local paper. He received the title because at one time he filled the double position of market editor and dramatic critic.
