Valuable Suggestions for the Kitchen and Dining Room. PICKED-UP MEALS
Often what is known as a picked-up meal is the most satisfactory in every sense, not only in furnishing means for the disposal of cold remnants of food, but enabling the housewife to make up dishes that often tempt a jaded appetite with their savorness.

Beefsteak Pie. Cut into cubes the remnants of cold roast or steak, cover with boiling water, add several slices of onion, a piece of bay leaf and a little bouillon or stock; season with salt and pepper and simmer gently for about one hour.

Scalloped Corn Beef. Put one pint of milk in a double boiler; add a cupful of celery cut into dice and a large slice of onion. Cover closely and let heat to boiling point.

Creamed Chicken in Potato Baskets. This is a pretty way to serve cold mashed potatoes. Take three cupfuls of cold, mashed potatoes, add melted butter and cream enough to moisten sufficiently with the beaten yolks of three eggs.
