Woman's World BOLD CALIFORNIA GIRL HUNTERS

They Ride Behind the Hounds in the Fashion of the Plains Instead of the Riding Schools --Two Are Cross Riders and Think No Other Way Admissible.

California has in its hunting set three women riders of youth, daring, beauty and wealth, who would attract attention anywhere. They are the Brittan sisters, of whom it is said "two of them are twins and the other one isn't." The twins ride astride with divided skirts, and ride with the speed of the wind and the grace of girls who have ridden from childhood and learned their easy poise and seat by experience. The elder sister used to ride with bifurcated skirts and astride as the twins do, but of late she has grown more conventional, and now follows the hounds on the aneased bag sitting side saddle.

They are the daughters of N. J. Brittan, a wealthy club man of San Francisco, and spend most of their time on their father's ranch near Burlingame, a town in San Joaquin county. The young women are strictly "in society," but they refuse to be bound by its conventionalities when it comes to riding. The twins, Natalie and

DR. HILLIS' ADDRESS Spoke for Daughters of Revolution at a Special Service.

At the meeting of the General Society of the Revolution in Brooklyn this week there has been a large attendance. Special service at Plymouth church Sunday was largely attended and of marked interest. The church was elaborately decorated with national colors and above the pulpit was the banner of the society. Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis made an address in which he said: "The founders of this nation stood for more than a class; their work was for humanity. They worked for four things—equality, liberty, opportunity and intelligence. In liberty they harnessed the wild horse by legislation and made him subserve the best interest of mankind. Intelligence was secured by the common school to the common people. Formerly it was thought only wise to give it to a class and let it descend from father to son. Now we can depend on the enlightenment that is found through free schools, a free church and a free press. Our opportunities are to be had by the most modest man who is willing to try for them. Be the son of a washerwoman or a day laborer, he has the same chance for preferment as the son of the millionaire. There is no God who ordained it right for the larger interest of a greater height than an elm; it is endeavor. The purpose of our government is the manufacture of souls. Our liberty is assured to us by our own right. We have the means of correcting evils within the law, and ought to do it that way. It is unsatisfactory to witness the pattering of law with the outside of things." Dr. Hillis repeated a dream of his in an orchard, illustrating the futility of attacking errors by legislation instead of developing the morals of the community from the roots, by feeding the souls of the youth of the land. He closed by saying that the country was not rich in its temporal possessions, but in its morality and ought to do its duty to be the educator of the world.

Belle, ride on slippery little English saddles, and declare that the only way to ride well and safely is to bestride the horse. They used to wear bloomers, but decided that divided skirts looked better and answered the purpose just as well. Fox hunting is somewhat of a new sport in California, and the Brittan girls are among the few women who have taken it up there with enthusiasm. They are strikingly unconventional and picturesque figures in the hunt, for they dress as brilliantly as they ride. Their divided skirts are of green, and their hunting coats of the orthodox red. On their heads they wear little Derby hats and they give color and life to any landscape across which they sweep.

The three Brittan girls do not sit their saddles after the manner of the riding schools, but rather after the style of the easy riders of the Western plains, who have learned that the way to ride is to ride with your horse and not against him. The Burlingame Hunt runs would surprise those who are used to hunting in England or the easy long island country. Instead of smooth, regular fields, straight gates and open stretches of country, the Burlingame Hunt works over marshes, rough plowed fields, with rich crops of cobblestones in them, hillsides thick with bowlders, rough, rotten-banked little creek beds that must slide into and crawl out of, woods springing up in the path, with underbrush that reaches for the coat on your back; sudden ditches cut by torrents and hillsides wickedly perpendicular. This is the kind of a country the Brittan girls hunt over, and in the circumstances they are able to bring many good arguments to bear in favor of their divided skirts and astride riding.

STOCKS MOVE WELL Some Heavy Lumber Sales in the Ashland District.

EASTERN BUYERS ON THE GROUND Sawing Season Just Commenced—First Ore Trains to Ashland Started.

Ashland, Wis., April 25.—The past few days has seen a great deal of activity in the Chequamegon bay market. Many buyers have come, purchased stock and returned home, and others are still here. Many other lumbermen from the lower lake region are on the way and will be in Ashland in a very few days.

The John O'Brien Lumber company yesterday sold 2,000,000 feet of Norway stock to the Gill Lumber company of Cleveland. This stock is on the docks of the John Schroeder company, and will be shipped to Cleveland. The O'Brien people also sold 1,000,000 feet to Chicago buyers. The only stock which the O'Brien company has for sale now is about 2,000,000 feet of white pine on the docks of the R. D. Pike Lumber company at Bayfield.

D. L. Wiggins closed a sale for Knight & Villas, transferring 1,500,000 feet of white pine stock to the South Side Lumber company of Chicago. The consideration was \$17,000. A. P. Brewer & Co. today sold to Street, Chaffield & Co. of Chicago 700,000 feet of white pine stock, which will be shipped to Chicago by rail. The consideration was \$10,000.

The John O'Brien Lumber company has let two sawing contracts, one of 10,000,000 feet to the R. D. Pike Lumber company of Bayfield, and another of a similar extent to the Akeley & Sprague Co. of Washburn. The ruling sawing price, \$2.25 per 1,000, governs both of these contracts. These logs will be brought from the O'Brien camp, near Iron River. Among the buyers here to-day are: J. L. Thornton of the John E. Burns Lumber company of Chicago, and Barker and Star of the Barker & Star Lumber company of Chicago.

The first sawmill on Chequamegon Bay to open the season of 1901 was the Murray Lumber company mill of this city, which began on its day and night run to-day. The Murray people have about 3,000,000 feet of logs in their booms at present, and 2,000,000 feet more will be present, and 2,000,000 more will be present, and 2,000,000 more will be present.
