IT MUST BE NEUTRAL

England's Position on the New Isthmian Canal Treaty.

ALASKA BOUNDARY CONCESSION

But This Will Not Be Pressed if the Canal Is to Be Made Neutral.

London, April 26.—No definite decision has been reached by the foreign office regarding the probable attitude of the United States senate toward the projected Nicaragua canal treaty. The negotiations on the Hay-Pauncefote treaty are understood to be based on the strict question of neutrality of the canal. If it can be definitely assured, it now seems likely Great Britain will agree to abrogate the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, though there is still the possibility of an endeavor by Great Britain to bring up the Alaskan boundary matter. This contingency is officially described as being merely a question of policy not likely to be pursued if the United States is content to make the canal neutral.

BRUTE ELUDES THE MOB

SIX-YEAR-OLD GIRL ASSAULTED

Crowd of 500 People Chases the Man a Mile—He Escapes on a Freight Train.

Chicago, April 26.—Little Zella Nicholson, the 6-year-old daughter of Albert Nicholson of the Boyd & Lunham company, living at 4366 Emerald avenue, was enticed into a small barn in the rear of her home this morning by an unknown man and assaulted, and she may die. Several hundred men, women, boys and girls gathered in the neighborhood of the Nicholson home, pursued the man, but after a chase of nearly a mile eluded his pursuers and escaped on a freight train. Mrs. Nicholson let Zella out into the yard to play in a few minutes a man appeared in the alley and coaxed the little girl into a barn on the opposite side. Mrs. Nicholson from a window saw her throat threatening to fall in its train. It is time a halt should be called before it is too late.

GENERAL LUDLOW IS ILL

SERIOUS CASE OF TUBERCULOSIS

He Will Return From Manila to the United States on the Next Transport.

Manila, April 26.—Owing to his illness, the Brigadier General, Brigadier General William Ludlow to military governor of the department of the Visayas has been revoked.

A board of surgeons reports that General Ludlow suffers from an attack of the grip and localized congestion, which has developed into a dangerous case of tuberculosis.

NEWFOUNDLAND SETTLEMENT

Negotiations Expected to Be Ended on Mr. Bond's Arrival.

London, April 26.—Premier Bond of Newfoundland has requested the British government to secure the ratification of the Bond-Blaine convention, and Mr. Chamberlain, the colonial secretary, has notified Mr. Bond that he has taken up the matter and has communicated with Canada.

BIG GRAIN CARGOES

Steamer Loads 302,000 Bushels of Oats at Chicago.

Chicago, April 26.—The steamer Hendrick S. Holden cleared yesterday from South Chicago with what is probably the largest cargo, from a point of bulk, ever loaded on the lakes. It is 302,000 bushels of oats, almost enough to fill a good-sized elevator. The cargo was shipped by the Merritt Elevator company to Buffalo.

London, April 26.—Colonial Secretary Chamberlain has authorized the Central News to state that the story that there are dissensions in the cabinet over the budget, particularly over the export duty on coal, which may lead to the resignation of the ministry, is untrue in every particular.

CROAKERS ARE SUBSIDING

BETTER TIMES IN PORTO RICO

Rich Are Opposing the Schools Because They Do Not Want the Poor Educated.

San Juan De Porto Rico, April 26.—It is not likely that those emigration agents will come here. Those already there had 2,000 natives recruited for Hawaii and expected to ship 1,000 of them on the steamer California Wednesday, but she sailed with only 544. The agents say that this is due to the opposition of the planters, who wish to retain the laborers until harvesting begins.

Secretary Hunt says the alcaldes and other officials in the interior towns acknowledge that the times are much better than a year ago and that the pessimists are gradually changing their opinion. The recent appropriation for road work will provide employment for hundreds of people and open up a wonderfully rich coffee country, which at present it is difficult to reach. Level-headed people see progress in the near future.

The federals here do not like to see the schoolhouses springing up. They are rich and do not worry about the education of their own children, but it annoys them to see the poorer classes educated to their intellectual level.

PROPHETS OF TROUBLE

Towne and Warren Talk About the Speculative Fever.

Chicago, April 26.—Senator Francis E. Warren of Wyoming and A. G. Foster of Washington were at the Auditorium Annex yesterday. Former Senator Charles A. Towne of Minnesota was also registered there. Senator Warren and Mr. Towne expressed themselves apprehensive of future financial trouble as a result of the speculative fever in connection with stock investments.

"The present boom is a prophet of disaster," said Senator Warren, "but it is hard to get away from the fact that conditions are certainly making for trouble. Thus it is impossible to reconcile the present price for certain stocks with their real earning capacity, and any one with an ounce of gray matter in his head knows a reaction to a legitimate basis is inevitable."

Mr. Towne said: "If any reliance is to be placed on the experiences of the past, then we are certainly riding for a hard fall, and one which I fear is likely to be witnessed from the top of its train. It is time a halt should be called before it is too late."

CALL FOR TROOPS

Clark Forces in the Grade Fight Demand Protection.

Ploche, Nev., April 26.—Unless Sheriff Johnson protects them in their position, the Clark forces contesting with the Harman interests for the possession of the railroad grade here, will demand that the governor call out the state troops. Formal notice to this effect has been served on the sheriff. He replied that he understood his duties, and would make no promise that he would protect the Clark forces. The crisis is expected to-morrow. The opposing forces of graders will then come together.

The Wheat Louse Danger

Guthrie, Okla., April 26.—The danger to the Oklahoma wheat crop from the green louse, that has appeared in indescribable numbers, is alarming. The louse has been steadily trailing northward for about two weeks and has reached the Kansas line. In some of the large fields of southern Kay county the louse was not observed until four days ago. The report of the United States crop bureau at Oklahoma City for the week ending last Monday showed that the louse was confined mostly to that part of Oklahoma east of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad to the Indiana territory line, but is probable that the louse has spread further west since this report was compiled. In the rich wheat district surrounding El Reno the louse has been at work for several weeks. Many fields have been practically destroyed. Henry Lassen, an El Reno miller, said yesterday that generally the fields were in condition to give a hopeful outlook, but unless there was a change for the better in three or four days the crop would be seriously damaged. C. H. Stevens, representing the Purcell Mill and Elevator company, has been traveling in Oklahoma for more than a week, examining fields. His report is discouraging, but he said it was too early to say positively that the crop would be ruined. The only thing that can save the crop is the louse is green in color and resembles the louse that infests rose plants.

OTHER PEOPLE'S NOTIONS

Rev. Dr. Lawson Answered.

To the Editor of The Journal: Kindly permit me to say a word in answer to the thoughtful remarks of Rev. Dr. A. G. Lawson, uttered concerning what he imagines to be Christian Science, but which is not Christian Science, and published in your issue of April 19 under the heading, "War of Christian Science."

Dr. Lawson says: "As a professedly Christian church, the organization throws down every vital doctrine of Christianity." The same accusation was formerly made against some of the now so-called orthodox churches.

The new in theology has ever been heresy as heresy and persecuted as such. Historically the orthodoxy of to-day has been the heresy of the past, and the persecutors of to-day have been the persecuted of the past.

Even Jesus Christ suffered death at the hands of the theologians of his time for what they termed his heresy and blasphemy; and in every age those who loved and followed him most devotedly and most unselfishly have, as he foretold, drunk of his cup.

The first given of the Christian Science church is set in our text book, "Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker G. Eddy, namely (page 49): "As adherents of truth, we take the Scriptures for our guide to eternal life." In no other denomination do Christians study the Holy Bible more earnestly and reverence it more sincerely, or love Jesus Christ more deeply and follow him more closely. In interpreting the Bible, we use all the light thrown upon it by the higher criticism of the most advanced Bible students, and we accept the Bible in its entirety, in its simple and natural meaning, neither isolating texts nor distorting them to conform to a man-made creed. We seek the "undivided garment," the whole of Christianity, as taught by Jesus and as tried by his tests, and it is on this basis that Christian Science stands to-day, as the primitive Christianity of Jesus restored to its original simplicity and purity. The Apostle Paul says: "Other foundation can no man lay than is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

Dr. Lawson says: "As a science it discredits even the best demonstration." Every advance of scientific truth has met with a cold reception from the prevailing theories of science. Agassiz wisely said: "Every great scientific truth goes through three stages—first, people say it is crazy; next, they say it has been discovered before; lastly, they say they have always believed it." The accepted theories of science and of philosophy are constantly changing, and this teaches the broad tolerance which should characterize all true science, philosophy and religion.

Dr. Lawson says: "It is, however, an immoral system." The Bible teaches, and therefore, Christian Science teaches, honesty, integrity and purity of the strictest and severest character. A violation of this rule would subject the perpetrator to prompt exclusion from our church, with just the same certainty as in other Christian churches.
