CORN SHORTS ARE UNEASY

FRANTIC EFFORTS TO GET CORN PHILLIPS ENCOURAGES THEM BY SELLING 600,000 BUSHELS CLOSE TO FIFTY-EIGHT CENTS.

Chicago, May 3.—A panic, the first real one since Phillips cornered the market, occurred today among shorts in May corn on the basis of a price fluctuation were the most violent in years.

Having seen their losses grow heavier and heavier with each succeeding day for some time, the traders who had guaranteed to deliver May corn to Phillips made frantic effort to get it. The price went from 55c to 58c, 1/2c higher than yesterday's close, in a few minutes. For an hour shorts bid close to 60c.

Then Phillips let out 600,000 bushels at prices ranging between 57 and 58 cents. It was thought for a moment that he was about to unload, and the market broke 25 cents without a check. The drop disposed of a number of "tailers."

Under 57 cents, however, Phillips sold nothing. In consequence prices reacted sharply, when traders realized that the end of the corner was by no means at hand.

BUCKET SHOP FIGHTS

Asks Annulment of Board of Trade Quotation Service Contract.

Kansas City, May 3.—The Christie Grain & Stock company to-day filed an answer to the suit brought by the Chicago Board of Trade to restrain the company from using the complainant's quotations on the ground that it is a bucket-shop. The defendant alleges that the Board of Trade does a similar business to that of bucket-shops, and asks the court to void the contract between the Board of Trade and the telegraph companies by which the telegraph companies are given the exclusive right to send quotations to such persons as the Board of Trade names, the defendant insisting that the quotations belong to the public, and that such contract is in violation of the interstate commerce act and the pool and trust law of Missouri.
