ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE North Dakota Light Stove Company. We, the undersigned, who shall associate ourselves together for the purpose of organizing a corporation under chapter 11 of the laws of the state of Minnesota, and all acts amendatory thereof, and to that end do hereby adopt and sign the following articles of association:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be North Dakota Light Stove Company. The general nature of its business shall be the manufacturing and selling of stoves, ranges, furnaces and heating devices of every nature, working in and of iron, tin, zinc, copper, brass, and any other metal, as founders and manufacturers of stoves, ranges, furnaces and heating devices of every nature, and of any other castings, and of all valves, fixtures and apparatuses in any way appertaining to stoves, ranges, furnaces, boilers and heating devices of every nature.

ARTICLE II. The time of the commencement of said corporation shall be the 15th day of May, 1901, and the period of its continuance shall be thirty years.

ARTICLE III. The amount of the capital stock of said corporation shall be twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars, and the same shall be divided into 400 shares of \$50 dollars each.

ARTICLE IV. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the amount of its paid-up capital stock.

ARTICLE V. The names and place of residence of the persons forming this association for incorporation shall be: Charles E. Ballard, Henry J. Glasser, all residing in the city of Minneapolis, Minnesota.

ARTICLE VI. The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a board of directors, not less than three nor more than seven in number, all of whom shall be stockholders in the corporation.

ARTICLE VII. The officers of this corporation shall be elected at the board of directors annually at the annual meeting of said board, and shall be a President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, which two last named offices may be held by one and the same person.

Comparative Statement of Hennepin County's Finances

The figures below are grouped together for the various county expenditures for the past five years. They make interesting reading, as the first column under each year shows what the county commissioners asked the board of tax levy for, and the next column what they actually expended for the various purposes the same year. In fact, the custom has become well established of apparently paying little attention to the amount allowed by the board of tax levy, but the commissioners spent all they desired, not being influenced by the fact that there was not money enough in the treasury, but went on spending just the same, and called it "county revenue fund overdraw." paying it back out of the funds and then carrying over another deficit which grew larger from year to year. The year 1898 seems to have set the high water mark for extravagance in county expenditures.

The \$5,523.89 used from the "emergency" fund during 1900 for stationary, printing and incidentals. The amounts included in above items for which it was used, \$35,356.11 per month; \$1,162.39 per day for every day in the year. \*Fees for county officers means for sheriff about \$25,000 and coroner \$2,500. Balance of the above amount was for "salaries" every day.
