Tragic Passing of "Bulldog" Regan

Cass Lake, Minn., May 14.—The death of Dan Donovan, better known as "Bulldog" Regan, at Cass Lake, marked the passing of one of the most noted characters of northern Minnesota. He was known to the police of every town in Cass, Beltrami, Itasca and St. Louis counties. He knew no fear, and was always ready to enter into a physical combat with anyone who disagreed with him.

One of the fingers was missing from his right hand. This was the result of a fight with an Indian at Deer River some years ago. Regan hit the Indian so hard that he broke the finger and the member was subsequently amputated. In another combat with a lumberjack, at West Superior, his face was bitten, leaving a scar from his mouth to his chin. His head was covered with scars and abrasions, the result of being pounded by policemen who were attempting to arrest him.

The object of his trip will be to study the life of Swedish settlers in America and their descendants, their status in the adopted country, their language, educational institutions, churches and what information to Sweden at home as to the condition of the million or more Swedes residing in America.

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Regan had been driven out of nearly every town along the line of the Eastern Minnesota railway, and was ordered out of Cass Lake the night previous to receiving the wounds which caused his death. With the reckless tenacity which gained for him the sobriquet of "Bulldog," he immediately returned only to meet his death. His tragic end was in keeping with the life he had led. Donovan, of Regan, was born in Peterboro, Ont., and was about 45 years of age. He was buried at Cass Lake on Saturday, with no relatives or friends to witness his interment.
