Supposing for the sake of the argument that the skipper of the new vessel is not keen to win—the superstitious do not enter into the slightest degree—it would puzzle him or any one else to account for her being beaten. If the Shamrock II should turn out less speedy, it will be a book to read. The new vessel is not a new vessel, it is a new vessel. It will fall back on the old boat and with her win the cup. Should such an event occur some difficulty might arise under the terms of gift provided for in the tournament. Yachtmen know very well that the Shamrock I would sail a vastly improved boat, though their opinions as to her chances might not be very high. "Skipper's" View.
