New York, May 22.—The Tribune says: AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE DISPOSAL AND REMOVAL OF GARBAGE AND OTHER OFFENSIVE MATTER, which ordinance is as follows:

SECTION I. Except as herein permitted and regulated, it shall be unlawful for any person to deposit upon any premises within the limits of the village of Deephaven any garbage or any other unwholesome matter.

SECTION II. It shall be the duty of every householder residing within the limits of said village to provide and retain a suitable receptacle upon the premises occupied by him of such size, shape and character as the village council may designate...

SECTION III. The street commissioner or any other person, as the village council may for that purpose designate, shall, at such time as the village council may determine...

SECTION IV. Any violation of any provision not complying with this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$10.00 or imprisonment not exceeding 10 days, or both.

SECTION V. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. Passed this 12th day of May, A. D. 1901. HAZEN J. BURTON, President of Council of Village of Deephaven, Minnesota.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF Northern Water Power Company. Know All Men by these presents, that we, the undersigned, citizens of the State of Minnesota, do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a corporation...

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be "Northern Water Power Company." The general nature of its business shall be the acquiring or constructing, and the improving and developing of water power upon the Mississippi river and its tributaries within the State of Minnesota...

ARTICLE II. The time of commencement of this corporation shall be the twentieth day of May, A. D. 1901, and the period of its continuance shall be thirty (30) years.

ARTICLE III. The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty thousand Dollars (\$50,000), and the same shall be paid in at the times and in the manner prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject shall be Fifty thousand Dollars (\$50,000).

ARTICLE V. The names and residence of the persons forming the corporation are as follows: Emanuel Cohen, John B. Atwater, Frank W. Shaw, Frank W. Shaw, Edwin C. Garrigue and Kay Todd, all residing at Minneapolis, Minnesota.

ARTICLE VI. The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a Board of five (5) Directors, and its officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Directors from their number, and the other officers of the corporation shall be elected and held by one person. Said Directors and said officers shall hold their respective offices for one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VII. The capital stock of this corporation shall be divided into Five Hundred (500) shares of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) each.

Bankers affiliated with the Harriman syndicate say that collateral for the entire \$100,000,000 Union Pacific first lien convertible 4 per cent gold bonds of 1901 recently auctioned, application for listing which has already been deposited by the Union Pacific, but the exact nature of this collateral remains unknown. It is understood that the \$75,000,000 of Southern Pacific stock purchased in February with the proceeds of \$40,000,000 of the bonds represents part of it, and it is assumed that the Northern Pacific stock recently bought, aggregating at least \$78,000,000 par value, according to the statements of Union Pacific interests, will also be deposited as collateral security.

OPPOSE MORGAN AND HILL N. Y. Central and Pennsylvania Interests Confer.

New York, May 22.—The Tribune says: The conference just held between J. J. Cavanah, president of the Pennsylvania railroad, William K. Vanderbilt, H. McK. Twombly and other directors of the New York Central at the Grand Central station, led to the report that a successor to Samuel R. Callaway was the subject under discussion. This was denied last night. It is now said that the western situation—that is, the control of Union Pacific and Northern Pacific—was under discussion. It is understood that the Pennsylvania and the New York Central will act in harmony in protecting their interests in the western territory, just as they act in harmony in the east. The Pennsylvania is practically in control of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad now, and will, it is said, operate it in harmonious relations with the Union Pacific and Chicago & Northwestern, both of which are practically Vanderbilt roads. It is also said that the Morgan-Hill scheme in the northwestern territory is viewed by these interests with disfavor.

UP TO DATE A Progressive French Railroad's Latest Departure.

New York Sun Special Service. Paris, May 22.—The Western railroad company of France, which has put on up-to-date and second class, which are noted for their comfort, is keeping up its go-ahead methods, and has almost completed a new branch line, which will be run by electricity, uniting Paris, Versailles and Rambouillet. The speed of the new line will be a world's record breaker, and the trains will run at 110 kilometers (about seventy miles) an hour. President Loubet will inaugurate the line, which extends along it between Paris and his summer home at Rambouillet.

Omaha's Identifiers. The passenger department of the Omaha road has issued a new set of free distribution little nickel "identifiers" to hook to key rings. It is in the form of two little round buttons that fit into a hole in the pocket and when pulled apart they disclose a roll of paper on which the owner's name and address appear in a cursive hand.

Pretty Souvenirs. A. E. Johnson & Co., the local steamship agents, are bringing out some unique advertising souvenirs, issued by the American Line of steamships. The souvenirs are in the form of small trays, handsomely ornamented and with a picture of a big ocean liner. The trays come handy in a smoking-room for cigar ashes, and in the home for pins, etc., and are in great demand.

N. P. May Get Tacoma & Eastern. It is rumored that the recent visit to St. Paul of W. J. Pearce, Tacoma, assistant to President Mellon, of the Northern Pacific, may result in the sale of the Tacoma & Eastern to the Northern Pacific. Such a transfer would settle the difficulty regarding the extensions to the Nisqually, Wash., coal fields. While the Tacoma Eastern people ask a price which is almost prohibitive, the Northern Pacific will either have to buy at the price fixed or demand a higher price, which is determined to that country.

J. J. Hill Returns. President James J. Hill, of the Great Northern, who returned from Europe yesterday, says that he believes the Burlington deal will be carried out at the time expected. Discussing the slow manner in which Burlington is being sold, he says: "My information is possibly later than yours. I think, as you indicate, that the two-thirds demanded was deposited May 18, but recent advices that I have received state that about 95 per cent—1 might say practically all the stock—has not been deposited."
