

TOWNS GRAY "QUITS"

Pierre and Fort Pierre Distracted by the Smallpox Quarantine.

TALK OF APPEAL TO THE COURTS

Committee From Each Place to Treat-Effective Boycott on Pierre Merchandise.

Pierre, S. D., May 22.—A meeting of the business men and officials of Pierre was held yesterday to arrange for a peaceable settlement, if possible, of the quarantine difficulties existing between Pierre and Fort Pierre.

Various schemes have been suggested to raise the boycott against Pierre merchandise. One is to stop the transportation of any goods to that town from this side of the river, and another is to stop the running of boats across the river.

The matter is in such shape that it is difficult to tell just how it will come out or when the end of the struggle will be reached, although the best sentiment in both towns is in favor of an honest and liberal settlement of the trouble.

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SUDDEN TAKING OFF

Captain Barker of West Superior Found Dead.

West Superior, Wis., May 22.—Captain C. S. Barker dropped dead in a room in his office. He is supposed to have died about 9:30 in the morning, but it was after 2 o'clock in the afternoon when his body was found.

Captain Barker was 59 years of age and had resided in this city for seventeen years, coming here from Sault Ste. Marie. He had been engaged in government contracting work at the western shore of Lake Michigan and at this point, nearly all of his life.

BELL A HARD MAN TO KILL

BARABOO MAN WITH A RECORD

One Out of 400 to Survive an Electric Shock—Two Close Calls on the Rail.

Baraboo, Wis., May 21.—It is said that a cat has nine lives, but William J. Bell, manager of the Baraboo telephone, has more, that is, he has escaped death many times during his life and is not a very old man yet.

Mr. Bell, was born near Dayton, Sauk county, Feb. 11, 1858. His father, Captain J. K. Bell, was for many years pilot on boats running through the Dalles at Kibbourn.

WILLIAM J. BELL

The summer months and in the winter was a brakeman on the fast passenger called the "Flying Dutchman" on the river division of the Milwaukee.

He was with the railroad company two years and then secured a position with the St. Paul telephone company and afterwards became vice president and general manager of the corporation.

During his labors in St. Paul he received an electric shock from a Westinghouse alternation current wire and was unconscious nearly forty-eight hours and a cripple for two years afterward.

It was at this time that the subject of electrocution was much discussed and he was called before the New York state legislature to give his experience. His testimony had great weight with the legislature from the fact that out of over 400 who had experienced a similar shock by electricity, at these convolutions Mr. Bell came into close touch with Thomas A. Edison, Harold P. Brown and many other noted men.

Mr. Bell established the theory that death by electrocution was painless and that those who executed took the place of hanging in New York state.

About three years ago he and two other men were shocked by a bolt of lightning. Mr. Bell being thrown from the top of a pole and his two companions from the tree, both, however, received only slight injuries.

STIRRED UP IN SERBIA

REVOLUTION CLOSE AT HAND

For the First Time in His Life Alexander Is Showing Strength.

Vienna, May 22.—Serbia is on the verge of a revolution. The Obrenovitch dynasty, always hated, is certain to be overthrown because of what is regarded as a swindle in which both king and queen were involved. For Alexander is showing strength for the first time in his life, and has repelled all suggestions from the cabinet that he divorce his queen. Republicans are holding meetings in many towns and have issued a manifesto calling upon the people to rise and drive the royal swindlers into exile.

The Pan-Slavs, probably backed by Russia, are reviving the old plan to unite Serbia and Montenegro under the rule of Prince Nicholas. Another faction is agitating the right of Prince Karageorgiev to the throne, while another is standing by the present king and queen.

Paris, May 22.—President Loubet has just received J. Pierpont Morgan, the American financier. General Horace Porter, the United States ambassador, presented Mr. Morgan at the Elysee palace, and the banker thanked the president of the French republic for the decoration of the Legion of Honor, which was presented as one of the honors conferred upon foreigners in connection with the international exposition of 1900. Mr. Morgan assured President Loubet of the sympathy and admiration of the United States for France. The president answered in the same general pleasant manner and complimented Mr. Morgan upon his fluent use of the French language.

Jest at a Picnic Will Cause a Death

Omaha, Neb., May 22.—George Hinkle is dying at his home near Beatrice, Neb., as the result of a jest played at a picnic. A party of young people had gone on a fishing trip up the Blue river, and as they ate their lunch, a shooting contest was begun. Hinkle laid a wager that Michael Folk, a young farmer, could put more bullets into the bull's eye than any marksmen present. The match proceeded and Hinkle's champion could do no better than third. Not satisfied with this test, Hinkle urged that his favorite still possessed as keen an eye and as steady a hand as any in the state.

In proof of his belief, Hinkle offered to hold his hat aloft at twenty paces and allow Folk to pierce it with a twenty-two caliber bullet. The aim of the young marksman grew worse rather than better, however, for the leaden bullet pierced Hinkle's wrist close to the joint.

The picnickers made all haste back to the town and the injury was given attention as soon as possible. The ball is imbedded deep in the forearm, however, and the surgeon has so far failed to extract it. This morning blood poison had developed, and the injured youth is in a critical condition. He says that the shooting was done in a spirit of bravado and he attaches no blame whatever to Folk, except for his inaccurate aim.
