Washington—The monthly statement of the collection of posts in the department of receipts for April, 1901, to have been \$38,941,579, an increase as compared with April, 1900, of \$6,589,929.

Quincy, Ill.—Rev. Frederick W. Taylor of Springfield was elected coadjutor to Bishop Burgess at the annual convention of the Episcopal diocesan convention.

New York—General Brooke has ordered commands of posts in the department of the east to send him on Sept. 1 a complete report of the results which ensued upon the abolition of the county sheriff.

Washington—Several Kiowa Indians, Lone Wolf, White Buffalo and Ko-Koy-Tandie, called on Acting Secretary of the Interior Ryan yesterday with a request for the opening of Kiowa lands to settlement.

Santa Fe, N. M.—William Park was shot and killed at central, county, in the office of Justice of the Peace Joseph Crowley, during the preliminary examination of May Esmond, charged with a serious crime.

Washington—The controller of the currency has authorized the conversion of the county bank of Redwood Falls, Minn., to the First National Bank of Redwood Falls, Minn., with \$25,000.

Washington—Lieutenant John J. Knapp has been detached from the transport and assigned to the nautical school at Manila, taking the place of Lieutenant Richard P. Tower, ordered to duty at a court-martial for alleged complicity in commissary frauds.

STILLWATER—George H. Atwood, a prominent local man, has purchased the Staples-Atlee mill, in this city. The price paid was about \$40,000.

CLOQUET—It is expected that the St. Louis river water-power, above Cloquet, will be developed by the Weyerhaeuser interests. The company is capitalized at \$100,000.

LITTLE FALLS—The board of education accepted the resignation of Louis Weichard as principal and elected Eva Louise Barry, of Little Falls, to fill the vacancy.

HENNING—The Henning Creamery company was organized. President, A. S. Winneburn; vice-president, A. W. Price; secretary, E. T. Dillner; treasurer, W. H. Hipple; directors, J. M. Hursb, A. T. Nelson and George A. Foulson.

NORTHFIELD—In view of President Ryan's repeated requests to be released from his duties as president of Carlton college, the chairman of the board of trustees has been authorized to appoint a successor at the annual meeting of the board in June.

ST. CLOUD—Father Abbot Peter Engel, of St. John's abbey, has received from Rome the appointment of Rev. Alfred Mayer, O. S. B., as prior of Cluney Priory, at Westburg.

WISCONSIN

CARTWRIGHT—A force of men is here to gather stone and ship it to Eau Claire for city use.

CLEAR LAKE—The foundation is being laid for the new bank building to be erected by F. A. Partlow.

HUDSON—Mrs. Maria A. Agnew has sold to Dr. P. D. Parker of St. Paul her beautiful residence property in North Hudson.

MADISON—R. W. Wood, assistant professor in physics at the university, is to leave. He has accepted a call to fill a full professorship at Johns Hopkins university.

ASHLAND—Senator Spooner has recommended the appointment of D. G. Sampson of Ashland to the position of receiver of the United States land office, to succeed Nels Anley, who resigns.

MARINETTE—Joe Man, an Indian, living in the western part of Florence county, brought in the pelts of thirteen baby wolves. He captured them after a hard fight with one of the mother wolves.

GRAND RAPIDS—The business men here sent in a petition to the Milwaukee, Princeton & Northwestern Wisconsin Central and Great Bay & Western railroad officials asking that a union station be built here.

LA CROSSE—Unless the Presbyterians accept the proposition of the Norwegian Lutheran synod within a week, the deal by which the latter was to come in possession of Gale college of Galeville, Wis., will be declared off.

WEST SUPERIOR—The street car company has been given notice that it must submit to the city, before the meeting of the council next Tuesday evening, a statement of what it proposes to do in regard to double tracking the East End and South Superior lines.
