## Can't Punish Them

### Fishers Who Catch Bass Are Not Prosecuted.

#### LAWMAKERS OMITTED PENALTY

So Bass and Trout Law Recently Passed Is Practically Inoperative—Respect Due It.

Although it was obviously desirable not to call attention to the fact, several papers have gone so far that the angling public may as well know, in these last few days before June 1 that the law forbidding the catching of black bass until that date is inoperative. The law is made ineffective because of the failure of the legislature to attach to the measure a penalty clause, which makes it impossible to secure any convictions under the act.

That was why Deputy Game Warden Johnson, a few days ago, released four youthful anglers whom he caught with a string of bass at Lake Calhoun. It was not until he made the arrest that his superior officers impressed upon him the futility of proceeding against the offenders, and they were accordingly allowed their liberty.

**Some Fishers Will Not Fish.**

The fact that the legislature intended to make the law a binding one, and that it is technically against the law to catch bass, even though no penalty attaches, will doubtless be enough to keep law-abiding anglers from making any inroads on bass preserves. The other fellows would catch bass, anyway, so a great deal of harm will not be done. The fact is, it is pretty well known among anglers that the law is defective. The word was quietly passed around weeks ago, and that explains, in part, why fishermen have dared openly to boast of catching the forbidden fish.

To-day's weather, while somewhat chilly, is all right for fishing, according to the notion of many veterans of the art, and several parties started out this morning.

**How the Law Reads.**

The amendment of chapter 221 of the general laws of 1897, entitled "An act for the preservation, propagation, protection, taking, use and transportation of game and fish," reads as follows:

Be it enacted by the state of Minnesota: Section 1. Amend section 22 to read as follows:

No person shall catch, take, kill, have in possession or under control, for any purpose whatever, any of the fish hereinafter mentioned within the periods hereinafter limited, to-wit:

Any variety of trout between the first day of September and the fifteenth day of April following, nor any black bass, gray or Oswego bass between the first day of March and the first day of June following.

Section 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage. Approved April 12, 1901.

Not the slightest allusion is made to any penalty.

Warden Sam Fullerton explains that he was sick at the time the amendment was introduced, and that as the measure had no special champion to see that everything was regular, it crept through in its unfinished state.

### A DELAY IN THE RACES

#### THE INJURIES OF SHAMROCK II.

They May Necessitate Change of Dates—New Boat May Be Built.

Southampton, May 23.—So far as can be ascertained, the hull of the cup challenger is not injured but she will be docked for a few days. Sir Thomas Lipton, George Watson and W. G. Jameson visited the boat to-day and decided that six weeks would be sufficient to put the cupped yacht again in racing trim, and that it will probably be necessary to ask for a delay in the date of the cup races for this length of time.

In their opinion most of the other spars were quite heavy enough and the whole trouble arose from the breaking of a shroud, and the bobstay fastenings.

Sir Thomas Lipton takes the accident philosophically, but the comments of the men show that this culminating misfortune, coming on top of the minor accidents which have happened at nearly every trial, has quite taken the heart out of the crew. Past mishaps which were glossed over at the time of occurrence are now magnified and not one of the hands has a good word to say for the boat. It is now admitted that all are bitterly disappointed with her form as against that of the old boat and the general hope is expressed that Sir Thomas Lipton will decide to build a new yacht before sailing off his challenge.

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### INTERNATIONAL RULES

#### A Move for Uniform Athletic Regulations for All Countries.

Paris, May 23.—The Olympic games committee met at the Automobile club this morning to discuss a proposal, submitted by R. Shelton, in behalf of the athletic union of America, that the committee draw up international rules for athletic contests, to do away with the existing diversity in various countries and associations. The committee decided to take the matter under consideration.

### After American Polo Cup.

New York, May 23.—One of the most interesting features of the present polo season will be the attempt of the American players to win back the American cup, captured several seasons ago by a picked team of British players. The American players will select a crack team, and a series of matches will be arranged to be decided on the international field at Hurlingham. The game was comparatively new in this country when, a few seasons ago, the English players came here and, aided by well-trained ponies, won the vase. It is announced that some of the leading American players have agreed to challenge for the trophy, and that a picked team will probably leave this country in July for Hurlingham.

### Brokers Relieved

Mr. Morgan Helps Dealers in Northern Pacific Common.

London, May 23.—The Times says that with the view to ameliorating the strained situation in the market for American railway securities here, caused by the difficulty in obtaining Northern Pacific common shares for delivery against sale contracts, J. P. Morgan & Co. have intimated to those brokers who have the right to call from them shares against options maturing from the end of June to the end of October that such options may be exercised at the approaching settlement on the payment of 25 per share. This announcement has relieved some brokers who were in a difficult position. It is hoped that other houses will follow this lead. The situation remains very unsatisfactory and cannot be allowed to exist for any definite period, as seems to be fondly hoped in some quarters. Those who were unable to deliver Northern Pacific shares at the last settlement have had ten days already, and it is probably wise to grant some further delay, but it ought to be short.
