### GOOD PLACES

The U. S. Civil Service Commission offers them. The United States civil service commission announces that examinations for a botanical clerk's position in the department of agriculture will be held on June 18. The minimum age limit is 20. Eight consecutive hours. On the same day an opportunity will be given those who wish to become zoological clerks in the bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture, to take an examination. The position pays \$840 salary per annum. An assistant ethnologist is also desired. The examination for this position will be given June 18. The man who gets this place will work in the Smithsonian Institution for \$100 a month. On July 3 the commission will determine which of the applicants is entitled to the position of superintendent of farm and transportation at the Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, penitentiary. The salary will be \$1,000.
