Capital of Eighty Million Dollars Consolidated.

HEINZE PROPERTY PROMINENT

Montana Ore Purchasing Company Producing 40,000,000 Pounds of Copper Yearly.

New York, May 31.—At the office in this city of the Montana Ore Purchasing company it is stated that dispatches from the west announcing the incorporation under South Dakota laws of the United Copper company of Montana with \$80,000,000 authorized capital were correct.

The Montana Ore Purchasing company, which is the controlling interest in the new company, has recently come into decided prominence, and is now said to be producing copper at the rate of 40,000,000 pounds a year.

TOWNITE FUSTIAN

Charles A. Talks of a Third Term and Empire.

New York, May 31.—The supreme court decision in the Porto Rico cases means an attempt will be made by the republican party to elect McKinley for a third term. It means an attempt at concrete imperialism within the next four years.

This was the sentiment uttered last night by former Senator Charles A. Towne of Minnesota, at the Fifth Avenue hotel, where he is staying.

"I know," he said, "that the proposition to run McKinley for a third term has been seriously considered by republican politicians. They decided the people and won at the last election upon the plea of 'unsettled conditions,' and this chaotic decision of the supreme court gives further ground for carrying the same argument. It was used in the time of Augustus, and he became Emperor of Rome. It was used in the time of Napoleon, and he became Emperor of France."

"The efforts of the republican party have been to make the presidency a semi-monarchy, and I believe this decision, if it turns out favorably to the administration, will help make it an absolute monarchy."

"For myself, I believe we shall all come back soon to the old-fashioned idea of Americanism. I do not think we men of the United States will ever subscribe to the idea that the constitution framed by our grandfathers can and cannot, does and does not, follow the flag, is and is not supreme."

SOLDIER'S PIPE

It is the Cause of a Military Riot in Belgium.

Brussels, May 31.—An extraordinary scene occurred in the downtown yesterday when mutinous civic guardsmen paraded the streets singing the "Marseillaise" while the police had to be called in to protect the officers from the revolting troops. There has been friction for some time. While drilling yesterday a guardsman in the ranks lighted a pipe and when reprimanded for doing so insulted the officer who administered the reprimand. The guardsman was arrested, whereupon his comrades broke ranks, hoisted at their officers and proceeded to demolish property on the parade ground with the butts of their rifles. Subsequently they paraded the streets singing.

HOLD THEIR PLACES

Wisconsin Board of Control Re-elects Old Superintendents.

Madison, Wis., May 31.—The state board of control to-day re-elected all the superintendents of the state institutions under its supervision except for the school for the blind at Janesville, the school for the deaf and the state reformatory, action being deferred in these. The building committee was instructed to proceed at once in the erection of residences for the superintendents at Oshkosh, Mendota and Chippewa Falls at a cost not to exceed \$5,000 each.

London, May 31.—The Post, in bringing upon British steel manufacturers the call for their machinery up to date, admits that nearly all branches of applied science in England are far-reaching in extent, and that Germany and the United States and that it is merely possession of time-honored business connections and her freedom from administrative restrictions of welded monopolies which enable Great Britain to hold her own for the time being in the staple industries of modern civilization.

STATE INSURANCE Wisconsin Board of Control Awards Contracts for \$925,000. Special to The Journal. Madison, Wis., May 31.—The contract for insuring all the state charitable and penal institutions, awarded by the state board of control last evening, was divided among three bidders, all offering the same rate—4 per cent on all the institutions except the state prison, on which the rate is 5 1/2 per cent, all for three years. Those are the same rates at which the risks have been carried. The total amount of

insurance on all the buildings is \$925,000, and the state will pay a premium of \$10,000 for the three years. The division is made equally among the three bidders, and it is left to them to say how the policies shall be placed. The policies will be delivered by June 5, subject to the approval of the insurance commissioner, each bidder meanwhile depositing a certified check for \$1,000 to ensure the delivery of the policies. The bidders were W. E. Main and W. H. Russell of Milwaukee, the Culver Harper agency of West Superior, who were represented by Senator E. G. Mills, and Henry Johnson of Edgerton, represented by H. C. Sloan. The contract for the erection and completion of buildings at the home for the feeble-minded at Chippewa Falls was awarded by the state board of control to George R. Potter of Stevens Point. Seven bids were submitted, the figures ranging from those offered by Mr. Potter up to several thousand dollars higher. His figures were: For the completion of the administration building and dining hall, \$40,645; two dormitories, for boys and girls, \$29,200 each; schoolhouse, \$18,835. Only three bids were submitted for the completion of the cell wing at the state reformatory, Green Bay, the lowest being \$70,065. All were rejected, the board believing that better figures can be obtained at a later day.

KNIGHTS OF MACCABEES First S. D. State Convention of the Order at Aberdeen. Special to The Journal. Aberdeen, S. D., May 31.—The first state convention of the Knights of the Maccabees assembled in the grain palace in this city this forenoon with a large attendance. Daniel P. Markey, of Michigan, supreme commander of the order, is presiding. Last night a ball was given to the visitors in the grain palace, and tonight after the school of instruction, which will be held in A. O. U. W. hall, a banquet will be served. The order was

first established in this state about four years ago and has thirty-four tents with a membership of 1,802. The total membership of the order throughout the country is 500,000. In circuit court John E. Williams, charged with having fired the bars of M. C. Taylor, of Shelby township, was acquitted.
