
Gertrude Francena Eaton's essay was on the subject of "Literature, Why Do We Study It?" The study of literature was credited with giving the student discipline and pleasure.

A GREAT LAKE OF OIL NEAR THE GULF OF CALIFORNIA Supply Will Affect Transportation Problems on the Coast and the Pacific.

New York Sun Special Service Chicago, June 4.—A vast lake of oil covering forty square miles, situated near the head of the Gulf of California, is said by Perry S. Heath to be one of the great discoveries for establishing in the vicinity the great Southwestern railway terminal and seaport proposed by Senator Clark.

Refuse 1-Cent Rate. Chicago, June 3.—The Western Passenger Association, it was announced yesterday, has voted against raising the rate one cent a mile to the G. A. R. encampment at Cleveland. It is thought, however, that the roads will take independent action, as the Central Passenger Association's roads have already authorized the rate.

The Milwaukee Objects. The Milwaukee has notified its east-bound competitors that it will not abide by the 1901 rate and will not be bound by the rates recommended at Friday's meeting of the Milwaukee conference.
