

The Senior Promenade a Glowing Success



A blaze of light, a throng of happy young people, the rhythmic strains of music sounding above the soft splash of falling water and the hum of eager voices made the university armory a place of wondrous beauty last evening when the senior promenade, the last social function of the school year, drew the younger set like a magnet. The great hall was hung with a canopy of red, white and blue, with here and there a touch of the university maroon and gold resplendent against the dark rafters. The balcony railing was hung with bunting and over the stage a shield formed a centerpiece from which radiated fringed flags and bunting. Over a thousand electric lights, maroon and gold and white, shed a brilliant light over the gray throng and calcium lights played on the great fountain in the center of the hall, transforming the column of water into liquid fire that shimmered and sparkled as it fell among the tangle of ferns and palms at the base.
