

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 SPRING WHEAT How It Stands According to the 534 Government Report. Washington, June 11 .- Preliminary reports of the spring wheat acreage indicate a reduction of about 1,200,000 acres, or 6.4 per cent. Of the twenty states reporting 10,000 acres or upward in spring wheat, eight report an increase aggregating about 214 37% 14 71½ 44 85% 66 95 70 411/ 34,000 acres and twelve a decrease amounting to about 1,235,000. There is an increase in acreage of 10 per cent in New Mexico, 7 in Nevada, 4 in Arizona, 3 in Michigan, 2 in Montana and Utah, and 1 per cent in Wyoming and Washington; while in Iowa there is a decrease of 13 per cent, Oregon 8, Kansas 7, Wisconsin and Minnesota 6, Illinois, Nebraska, South and North Dakota and 1153 45% California 5, Idaho 4, and Colorado 2 per The average condition of spring wheat on June 1 was 92.0, as compared with 87.3 at the corresponding date last year and 91.4 on June 1, 1899. The mean of the June averages for the last ten years is 92.6 and for the last fifteen years 92.7.
