SETTING CUBA RIGHT

Belief That the Platt Amendment Will Carry.

Washington, June 11.—At the meeting today the cabinet will receive rather encouraging reports from Cuba. Late advice from Governor General Wood indicates that two or three members of the constitutional convention who at first were most active and outspoken in their hostility to the Platt law are now about to align themselves with the supporters of that law. This note the secretary of war probably that if a final vote is reached in the convention this week, the Platt law without modification or qualification, will be incorporated into the constitution of Cuba. The sharp note, the second on the subject, sent by Secretary Root to the convention through General Wood, is believed to have had the desired influence at Havana. It is believed that the secretary of war set forth plainly and unequivocally the attitude of this government as firm and unyielding.

DRAFTING AN ELECTORAL LAW

Government May Be Wholly in the Hands of the Cubans by Next Spring.

This note apparently has made it plain to the leaders of the radical party that in the end they would suffer in power and prestige by being exposed as the real and only obstructionists of Cuban independence. It is more than likely that in view of the changing mood among the constitution makers at Havana, the cabinet will discontinue its disposition to promulgate the electoral law for the first general election and the organization and equipment of the Cuban republic.

POPE LONGS FOR THE SEA

REPORT OF ILLNESS UNFOUNDED

Wishes He Could Go to Sea Again and Thus Renew His Youth.

Rome, June 11.—The report cable to the United States that the pope is again ill is without foundation. The statement circulated in America shows that the annual reports of the pontiff's illness, critical condition and fainting fits have already commenced and as the summer wears, he, no doubt, as usual, will be reported at death's door. The truth is, his holiness is in exceptionally good health, is enjoying his daily drive and walk, and the hearty care of state seem to bear lightly on his old age. Mounting to a higher point of the garden that usual the other day, the pope stood gazing at the yellow strip of sea, the Mediterranean and turning with a sigh to his nephew, the pontiff used for the first time since his "imprisonment," a phrase which he has been construed as impatience at his "captivity." He said: "Ah, now I wish I could go to sea again. I would really renew my youth. The last time I really stayed at sea was about fifty-five years ago, when I was nuncio at Brussels. I then went near Antwerp on the advice of a physician, and can vividly remember even now how cool the water was, how invigorating, and how refreshing I took swimming. RAILROAD RUMBLES.

TWO ROADS CLASH

Great Western and Chicago & North-Western in Redwood County.

Special to The Journal. Redwood Falls, Minn., June 11.—The Great Western and Chicago & North-Western railroad row in Redwood county is on in earnest. The Great Western corps of surveyors entered the county from Sleepy Eye last Friday. Their line of crossing the North-Western is about three miles west of Sleepy Eye, tapping the rich townships of Brookville, and also the northern portion of Sundown, two wealthy Redwood county townships. According to Assistant Chief Engineer Morgan of the Great Western, an air line through Redwood county to Wabasso and Marshall, Lyon county, is in mind from Marshall. He says, the surveyors are instructed to proceed due west, passing out of the state at about Hendricks, another Chicago & North-Western line recently built up by reason of the extension of the North-Western branch from Tyler.

Great Falls, Mont., June 11.—The rumor of last January, to the effect that the Great Northern was negotiating for the purchase of the Great Falls and Canada railway, has developed into a fact. The price paid was \$700,000. The Great Falls & Canada is 124 miles in length.

Judging by the size of the outfit the survey will be thorough.

Dispatchers at 'Frisco. San Francisco, June 11.—Delegates to the fourteenth annual convention of the Train Dispatchers' Association of America got down to business today. The convention will continue for two days.

Local Freights at Denver. Denver, Col., June 11.—The annual convention of the National Association of Local Freight Agents opened here today and will continue until Thursday. About 300 delegates are in attendance. Welcoming addresses were by Governor Orman, Mayor Wright and Sheriff Parker, and responses by J. H. Garner of the Southern Railway, Atlanta, Ga.; R. J. Judson of the Burlington & Missouri, Leavenworth, Kan., and A. D. Dyer of the Chicago & North-Western, Chicago. Executive sessions began this afternoon.
