Million-Dollar Mining Property Secured for \$4,000.

**SPOKANE MEN ALLEGE FRAUD**  
Rich Claims in the Coeur d'Alenes Under Litigation—Story of Alleged Intrigue.

Moscow, Idaho, June 12.—A sensational mining suit has been filed in the United States circuit court here. On one side are pitted Patrick Clark, the noted mining man of Spokane, and a group of associates; on the other, Charles Sweeney, the well-known Spokane operator; F. R. Culberson, another well-known Spokane mining man, and two big corporations mining in Idaho and operating financially in New York city.

Clark and associates charge Sweeney and Culberson of swindling them out of two million claims in the Coeur d'Alenes valued at a million dollars. They sue for the recovery of these claims, for a receivership and an injunction restraining defendants from extracting ore from the disputed ground, and for an accounting of the ore already extracted, which is valued at about half a million.

The complaint is an interesting story of intrigue and alleged misrepresentation by which it is claimed the injured owners of the disputed ground were induced to part with property valued at a million dollars for a consideration of \$4,000. The disputed claims adjoin the Tiger-Poorman mine at Burke, Idaho. Clark and the other complainants allege that Sweeney and Culberson unlawfully explored the disputed ground by means of drills located at a depth of 100 feet; that they located a great residue, broke into it, extracted ore, paid dividends and then bought the claims for \$4,000 on the alleged false representation that the ground was no good.

The title of the case is Patrick Clark, Benjamin Kingsbury, James Clark and James F. Harvey, complainants, vs. the Buffalo Hunt Mining company, a corporation organized under the laws of the state of New York, and Development and Improvement company, a corporation organized under the laws of the state of New York.

Colorado Springs, Col., June 12.—Following in the footsteps of "Anthony Tweedepunch, Phrenologist, hypnotist and palmist," the Rev. M. S. Riddell, lecturer on "Love, Courtship and Marriage," has put his foot in it.

Once before, in Lincoln, he forged a check for \$10, but his mother came from Chicago and paid back the money after which the affair was dropped.

**GREAT RACKET**  
Tons of Dynamite to Be Exploded in New York.

New York, June 12.—Three and one-half tons of dynamite are to be exploded under the Narrows between Fort Hamilton and Fort Wadsworth. The dynamite was used in torpedoes during the Spanish war as a defense to the harbor. After the war Major H. P. Adams, in charge of the corps instead of exploding the torpedoes, extracted the charges and stored the dynamite. Major W. L. Marshall has advertised for the dynamite to be exploded and bids for it. Major Marshall, therefore, has decided to sink the dynamite into the waters of the Narrows. Electric connections are to be made with the forts and the dynamite will be exploded by the touch of a key. When Major Marshall sets off his 7,200 pounds of dynamite, Staten Island fishermen expect to get a wonderful catch.
