Mayor Ames Blocks an \$18,000 Grab.

THAT USELESS SLATE CONTRACT

Mayor Ames' Jockeying is All for Nothing—What Will He Do Next?

Preliminary paving preparations in the city were hung up for a month this spring when Alderman Jake Foell jockeyed in the interests of his friend and fellow wardman, Martin Ring, who wanted the contract for furnishing the city with \$18,000 worth of crushed rock for macadam paving purposes on Seventh street SE. Foell made several clever plays and landed the contract for the man after a close struggle. But before this was finally effected, the council reconsidered its determination to pave Seventh street and ordered sandstone paving for University avenue instead. Thus the city was left with a contract for a large supply of crushed rock on its hands, and with no work to put it.

THE BULLETS MISSED

Two Workhouse Prisoners Race for Liberty. Archie Harris, aged 22, and Harry Litchfield, aged 18, made a wild break for liberty from the workhouse this morning, and at last accounts were still at large. The fugitives had evidently figured well on their chances of escape, and must have planned to break jail several days before they put their purpose into execution. They awaited only a favorable moment, and that came during the brief interval while their keepers were off guard this morning.

The delivery occurred while the prisoners were at breakfast in the dining-room of the workhouse at 6:20 o'clock. As the men were about to file from the room to resume their daily exercise at the rock pile, the warden of Robbinsdale stepped quickly to one of the windows, which are protected only by thin iron bars placed far apart. The ends of these bars are loosely inserted in slots, and it requires little ingenuity to get them out of place.

It was the work of a moment for the prisoners to remove the bars. Then, with an opening through which a man's body might easily pass, they threw themselves headlong from the embrasure in quick succession and made off on the dead run across the open grounds of the institution, before the startled guards realized what had happened.

They had a running start of 200 yards when Guard Doyle got in the game with his six-shooter and gave chase. Five times he fired at the fleeing men they ran north on the 500 tracks. The bullets failed to connect, and by the time the other guards joined in the chase, Harris and Litchfield had disappeared in a thicket of woods which skirt Robbinsdale.

Harris was sent to the workhouse June 2 for eighty days for larceny. Litchfield was sent up May 23 for sixty days for the same offense. Both men have reputations as daredevils. In resisting arrest on May, Harris shot at Inspector Crummer. A brass bullet flattened the bullet and saved the officer's life.

NO BERTILLON FOR SMITH Jail Prisoners, With One Exception, Are Measured. All of the criminals who have been doing time in the central station and the county jail while awaiting disposition of their cases have been put through the Bertillon system of measurements during the last few days. With one exception, the spunky colored burglar, who has had his face taken on many occasions before, but has always been a reluctant candidate for place in the rogues' gallery.

MORE VICTIMS Port Royal Mine Disaster Reported Still Worse. Port Royal, Pa., June 14.—Rumors are abroad to-day that more men than the eighteen first accounted for have been burned in the Port Royal mine. Two men from Smithton have been missing since the night of the explosion and the wild story was circulated that the number of unknown victims would reach thirty. A long search would be required to ascertain accurately the number of those entombed.

ELUSIVE J. ARROWSMITH

Accused of Larceny by Implement Dealers, He is Landed in Hennepin Jail.

John Arrowsmith was arraigned before Judge Brooks this morning on a charge of larceny in the first degree, under a grand jury indictment. He pleaded not guilty and was remanded to the county jail until he could secure \$4,000 bail.

The case against Arrowsmith is notable not so much because of the facts in connection with the alleged crime, as of the ease with which he seems to evade punishment without securing an acquittal. It is alleged that Arrowsmith, who resides at Holland, Pipestone county, obtained a large amount of agricultural implements from Minneapolis dealers under false representations, and the indictments accuse him of so defrauding the J. I. Case company of \$1,294 and Dean & Co. of \$1,210.25.

Arrowsmith secured the goods about two years ago while selling agricultural implements at Holland, and it is said that in no instance did he pay more than \$100 cash upon any purchase, and that in the aggregate he secured at least \$15,000 worth of goods, including a bill amounting to \$2,500 from the Aultman-Miller Co.

He was on hand at the dedication of the State Building on June 18. The Minnesota editors will be off for Buffalo to-morrow evening. The editorial party will contain 244 people, editors and their families, and would have been larger if more accommodations could have been secured.

Then the Pipestone man put in the defense that he had been robbed by his father-in-law. In his decision Judge Lochren treated Arrowsmith with severity, although no punishment was inflicted, the judge saying that he was unable to determine whether the man really had the money at the time the action was tried in court. The judge plainly stated, however, that there was no doubt in his mind that Arrowsmith had intended a gross fraud.

Following his acquittal on the charge of contempt, Arrowsmith was indicted by the grand jury of Pipestone county upon the charge of grand larceny, but his luck was still good, and he was allowed to go, the court holding that the action should have been brought in Hennepin county, where the alleged crime was committed.

The machine companies are determined to punish him by way of example and secured the present indictments from the Hennepin grand jury with the intention of pushing the cases to the limit. Arrowsmith was taken into custody by Sheriff Megaarden, who put in three days in making the trip and the arrest. He came along without resistance. It is expected that persons in Pipestone county will furnish his bonds, but until that is arranged Arrowsmith will have to stay in the county jail.

These to be Sentenced. To-morrow, Judge McGee will pass sentence upon the twenty prisoners who are either in the county jail at present or out on bail, having been convicted of crime in the recent session of the court. The list of those to be sentenced includes Bertha Schilling, convicted of manslaughter in the second degree; Everett S. Richards, convicted of assault in the first degree; Fred A. Briggs, the slot machine magnate, against whom there are two convictions; Belle Hoban, shoplifter; Wing Lung, opium joint keeper; Frank Hamilton, convicted of assault in the third degree; Herman Jackey, attempted robbery; Edw. David, attempted robbery; Edw. David, grand larceny in the first degree; William Smith, burglary in the first degree; and the following, convicted of grand larceny in the second degree: John Reilly, John Duffy, Herbert Forrest, Nic Vacos, Fred Lee and John Walker.
