THE BUILT SKANSKEN
Death of Dr. Arthur Hazellius at Stockholm.

HIS GREAT WORK HIS MONUMENT
Plans for the N. W. Sangerfest—Other Scandinavian Happenings at Home and Abroad.

Dr. Arthur Hazellius, the creator of Skansken, the marvelous park where all Sweden is to be seen in nature, died on May 27, in Stockholm, aged 70 years. It might be said that Dr. Hazellius consecrated his life to Skansken. Not only did he originate the idea, but he worked, talked, wrote and planned for it to the end of his days. Being a man of genius and original ideas and possessed of marvelous energy, he was able to accomplish a great deal.

As an outdoor museum, Skansken is probably the most complete and interesting garden of its kind in the world. Here all Sweden may be studied—its physical features, fauna and flora, customs and costumes of its people, and even its history. The grounds are very extensive and have been left as far as possible in their pristine beauty. The staff of attendants is a large one, but is also a part of the show, for the Laplanders and Dalar folk appear in their own picturesque costumes.

Several ancient churches and farm houses have been removed to the place and the ancient surroundings and furniture restored, as far as possible.

To increase public interest in Skansken fetes commemorating the more important events in the glorious days of Gustavus Adolphus and Charles XII. are held. The government and the people of Sweden liberally supported every suggestion made. Dr. Hazellius needs no other monument than Skansken.

THE NORTHWEST SANGERFEST
Ordered to Be Held at Sioux Falls, July 11-13, 1902.

At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Northwestern Scandinavian Singers' union, it was decided that the biennial sangerfest should be held at Sioux Falls July 11-13, 1902. That is the unanimous wish of the members of the Mandank of Sioux Falls. Many of the leading business men of the town among its members and they will make things hum when they take hold of the work. The union now includes eighteen singing societies, eight in Minnesota, four in Iowa, three in South Dakota, two in Wisconsin and one in North Dakota.

Decorah's Musical Festival.

The commencement exercises of Luther college, for the preparatory department, will be held Tuesday, June 18. Twenty-five will graduate, and going out in the college department, Thursday, the 19th, twenty-two will graduate. Rev. John Halverson of Minneapolis will preach the baccalaureate sermon next Sunday.

Nansen's Scientific Work.
The second volume of Nansen's "Scientific Results," devoted to astronomical, magnetic and pendulum observations, has appeared from the press. The results are most satisfactory. The work is the result of the observations made on the sledge journey, most of those which formed the basis for the discussions were made by Captain Sigurd Scott-Hansen, to whom Nansen accords his hearty appreciation. The astronomical observations are due to Professor Geelmuyden, who had assisted the expedition in its outfitting and by useful advice in the magnetic observations were compiled by Aksel Steen of the meteorological institute at Christiania.

The Orpheus Singers.
Orpheus, the Swedish singing society, is working industriously preparing for its participation in the singers' festival at Jamestown and Buffalo next July. The well-known World quartet, consisting of Mr. Wald, one and Messrs. Holmquist, Elmquist and Scott, all of St. Paul, has joined Orpheus and young composer promise. Two other recent acquisitions from St. Paul are the barytone, Professor John Swenson, the composer, director of the Art and Music club, and Professor Emil Anderson, the violinist. The brothers John and Richard Wallin are reported to be among the best vocal notes in the second bass. Orpheus will soon be heard in public. The Young People's society of the Augustan church is arranging a concert for June 23, on which occasion Orpheus will furnish the musical program, assisted by eminent soloists, among them Miss Eugenia Osborn, who has recently returned from New York.

The Vernamo Fair.
A reproduction of the famous Vernamo fair, or market, will be attempted by the recently organized Scandinavian Literary and Dramatic society. The fair will be held at the Minneapolis Driving park July 14-22. The fair will be something entirely new in the northwest. It will be an imitation of a country fair, or market, in Scandinavia one hundred years ago, with all the features of the popular fairs, except that the trading or exhibition of horses and cattle will be omitted. Large numbers of the traditional market booths, in which will be sold articles generally seen at those fairs, tents for restaurants and other purposes, open air stages and platforms, etc., will be erected inside the inclosure. The work will be daily supervised by the society, and will be an interesting and enjoyable for visitors. The society has opened up its fair headquarters in Richards' hall, corner Hennepin and Washington avenues.

Wants the Black Granite Mt.

To Aid St. Olaf.

This organization is to be similar to the alumni association but entirely distinct. Officers were elected as follows: Professor L. F. Grose, Northfield, president; Rev. C. M. Westvig, Bergen, Wis., vice president; Ivan Ringstad, Northfield, secretary and treasurer. A committee was appointed on constitution and by-laws. The next meeting will be held during commencement, 1902. All ex-students wishing to join will send their names and addresses to the secretary. There is no initiation fee.
