The Third National Bundes Shooting Festival.

AT SAN FRANCISCO IN JULY

Thousands Will Attend—Value of Prizes Will Approximate \$100,000.

Correspondence of the Journal. San Francisco, June 6.—Riflemen and crack shots from various points in Europe and South America are taking great interest in the coming shooting tournament to be held in this city, July 14 to July 23.

The coming tournament is a German affair and is styled the Third National Bundes Shooting Festival, held under the auspices of the National Shooting Bund of the United States.

Chance for Everybody. The prizes and medals are so numerous that every one competing can win something.

With these various teams will come an immense following. One New York club will come in two special trains and has engaged 300 rooms at the Palace hotel.

To entertain this influx of visitors, great preparations have been made. Two of the most prominent features of the festival are the Olympic Club and the torchlight parade and tattoo.

Although the Germans are most actively interested, shooting nationality will be represented. Shooting clubs of other character made up of Italians, Spaniards, French, Scandinavians, Swiss, Russian, Mexican, English, Greek and American will take part in the festival.
