ROCKEFELLER GIFT Quarter of a Million Dollars for Cornell University. Ithaca, June 19.—At a meeting of the board of trustees of Cornell university to-day President Schurman presented a letter from John D. Rockefeller, donating \$250,000 to the university on condition that an equal amount is contributed by others. The \$500,000 when secured will be used in providing additional accommodations for instruction and research.
